The custodians of Capital may abuse their position and grind the faces of labourers; and, labourers may form trades-unions and organize strikes; but, labour and capital will not quarrel any more than a man will quarrel with his meals.

THE OPENING OF THE Montreal branch of Laval University was solemnly celebrated on Sunday last in the chapel of the Seminary of St. Sulpice, Sherbrooke-street. There were present Archbishop Conroy, apostolic delegate, Archbishop Taschereau, Bishop Racine, Bishop Duhamel, Bishop Langevin, Bishop Moreau, Bishop Lafache, Canons Lamarche and Plamondon; Rev. Father Doyle, Superior of the Seminary of St. Sulpice; Mr. DeLavigne, rector of the Montreal College; Rev. Father Long, Abbe O. H. Paquet, the Professors of Theology of the Seminary, and about five hundred priests and ecclesiastics. The lecturers on law and medicine occupied seats reserved for them opposite the altar. Amongst them were C. S. Cherrier, Q. C., Hon. Judge Monk, Hon. Sheriff Chauveau, Mr. Jette, M.P., Mr. J. A. Oulmet, and Doctors Mourore, Coderre, D'Orsonnens, Trudel, Pelletier, Rottat, Brosseau, Lachapelle, Lamerche, and Beaudry. The Papal Ablegate pronounced the discourse for the occasion, speaking of the establishment in Montreal of a branch of the University "which was the glory of Quebec." At the conclusion of the mass a pontifical document was read empowering the Bishop of Montreal to give the papal benediction three times a year on the most important religious holidays, and to grant all the indulgences connected with that benediction. After mass the chief personages present were entertained at dinner, Bishop Conroy presiding. Subsequently in the great hall of the building Rev. Father Baile, in behalf of the Seminary of Montreal, and Mr. C. S. Sherrier, in the name of the Faculty of Law, presented to Bishop Conroy addresses suitable to the occasion. Bishop Conroy replied, and Bishop Fabre also spoke.
