the same time enough of our artificial human milk to make up the full amount required. But we are satisfied that good milk is not furnished by diseased or feeble women. Dyspepsia, in every form, is fatal to the production of harmless milk. If, therefore, such a mother nurses her child, the child must suffer. Even in cases where the mother furnishes only one-fourth of the quantity taken by the child, and where the other three-fourths are of excellent quality, we believe that the child will suffer. That is to say, we believe that such mothers give hurtful milk, and that it is better for the child not to have it.

Let us proceed a little further. Suppose that this mother, in opposition to our advice, persists in nursing her child. She will give milk for nine months perhaps, and then the

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
