KINGSTON, Oct. 19.—(Special.)—In a fire which broke out early this morning Constables Berrigan and Cotter and Henry Wood, jeweler, saved

three lives. The three people, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Stewart and a little girl visiting them, were asleep over the store of Ryan & Scott and were carried out from their beds in blinding smoke. The damage to the building was slight.

KINGSTON, Oct. 19.—(Special.)—The steamer Pierpoint, loaded with cattle, while on her way to Cape Vincent, N.Y., commenced to list as the

result of a stampede among the cattle. The vessel had to put in at Simcoe Island and unload 40 cattle before proceeding further on its way. In the excitement two were lost.

CORNWALL TO HAVE TECHNICAL SCHOOL

CORNWALL, Oct. 18.—(Special.)—Within a short time Cornwall will be supplied with an industrial and technical school, the classes for which will

be held in the evenings at the high school. This was decided at a meeting of the high school board last night, acting on the advice of Dr. Merchant, head of industrial and technical education for Ontario. The high school board has appointed a committee to complete arrangements as soon as possible.
