### **COLD WAVE HAS NOT HURT WHEAT**

Advices From Winter Crop Belt Reassuring—All Grains Lower.

CHICAGO, Jan. 30 .- Belief that the winter crop had escaped any immediate danger from a cold wave had a bearish effect today on the price of wheat. The market closed steady, but at a decline of 1-4c to 3-8c net. Other grain, too, showed a loss for the day—corn 3-8c to 1-2c and oats 1-8c to 1-4c. In provisions the outcome varied from a setback of 10c to 12 1-2c.

The absence of export demand was a constant incentive toward efforts to put prices on a lower level.

Enlarged offerings of hard winter wheat from west of the Missouri River were taken to indicate a decided change of sentiment on the part of

many producers. Prospects of continued saving of feed tended to weaken corn Demand for shipment from Chicago appeared to have entirely ceased. Prices opened a shade off to 1-8c to 1-4c up and then showed a disposition to sag.
Oats gave way with other grain. selling pressure was not especially

Support developed for provisions on account of hog supplies being restricted. First sales ranged from last night's level to an advance of 12 1-2c, but the gains failed to hold.

### PRUSSIAN LOAN **GREAT SUCCESS**

Notes Issued-Taken Up Rapidly.

BERLIN, Jan. 30 .- The issue of the BERLIN, Jan. 30.—The issue of the new Prussian loan of approximately \$90,000,000 in the shape of treasury notes is said today to have been a success. It constitutes a new type of public security in Germany, as it is redeemable by annual drawings covering a period of years. The entire redeemption will take sixteen years, but holders who do not wish to withdraw their money when their notes are drawn are to be allowed to convert them into four per cent. bonds. This lottery feature of the new financial transaction was adopted by the Government because of the failure of various public issues in 1913. As the treasury notes are redeemable at par and subscribers pay only 97 for them, those whose notes are drawn for redemption within the next few years will receive a high rate of interest, while the average return for the entire period of sixteen years will be fully 41-2 per cent. The government itself pays 4.3 per cent. for the excommodation.

It is thought probable that a further issue of about \$50,000,000 will be made later this year. These large sums are of the railroad and canal systems of Prussia and for other productive purposes.
