several new channels and the strengthening of the support of many which are now well established. The policy of several of the larger departments has shown new departures to be advisable, and these are provided for, mainly with the intention of making a start and bringing them before the house.

One of the more significant items on the list appears in connection with several miscellaneous sums, and sets aside \$5000 for the enforcement of the Canada Temperance Act. This seems to make clear the intention of the government to take some hand in the control of the new counties which have recently adopted this means of liquor restriction. It has been a public question for some time as to the authority of the province to enforce the Scott Act, it being under the direction of the federal government and the officers acting under the criminal code.

The exact intention of the license department is not plain. There is the possibility that they may ereate new peace officers out of several license inspectors and thus obviate many of the present difficulties in the matter of arrests for violation. Even so, however, any officer would require a warrant to seize any goods or make arrests, and this would be for him a handicap that does not now apply to the inspector under local option.

More Fire Rangers.

An attempt will be made by the minister of lands, forests and mines to better conserve the timber of the north, and to this end \$25.000 is set aside for additions to the fire-ranging staff. In the same department provision is made for
