

DOCTORS ANXIOUS TO GO TO FRONT

Many on Staff of Provincial Board of Health Offer Services.

TYPHOID VACCINATION

Value of Preventive Treatment Was Demonstrated in South African War.

Medical officers on the staff of the provincial board of health are daily volunteering for service at the front, and already several of these have been granted leave of absence. Dr. Bentley, district officer for Western Ontario, has volunteered his services, with a special request that he be sent to the scene of activities, and Dr. McLennan and Wodehouse, in charge of the Hamilton and Port Arthur districts, have enlisted in the militia. Provincial bacteriologist Amyot has forwarded notice of his willingness to assist wherever his services can best be made use of.

The department is making a special appeal in all recruiting centres for men to be vaccinated against typhoid fever. Dr. McCullough, chief medical officer, having already volunteered to supply all vaccine necessary for Canada, is now circulating the country to urge that his offer be accepted. He points out that in the South African war, fever carried off 2200 persons in comparison with 772 who died from typhoid, and that training ground experiments in the southern states have indicated that vaccination on a large scale will be under way within a few days.

LIVE HOG VALUES IN ANOTHER JUMP

Prices Advanced Yesterday Thirty to Forty Cents Per Hundred Pounds.

ALL CATTLE SOLD FIRM

Improved Demand for Stockers and Feeders Reported at Union Yards.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards yesterday were 47 cars—549 cattle, 887 hogs, 1120 sheep and lambs and 145 calves.

Two choice cattle were amongst the 649 of all classes offered for sale Tuesday, but prices for all grades were firm, even the canner bulls and cows being readily taken at good prices.

Prices for fat cattle were very firm at Monday's quotations, and all offerings were soon cleaned up.

Stockers and feeders were in demand by many farmers, who were on the lookout for supplies to turn on the stubble fields and fall grass, consequently prices were firm.

Milkers and springers, of which there was only a moderate supply, were in fair demand at \$9 to \$9.50 each, and one extra quality cow, weighing 1650 lbs., was bought by Fred Armstrong at \$120.

Veal calves of choice quality were again very firm, selling up to \$11 per cwt.

Sheep were firm, but lambs again dropped fully \$5, and several of the sellers asked 50c per cwt. and then they are too high, as few of the many offerings of Toronto have lasted this season, as prices have been prohibitive to nine-tenths of the toilers.

Hog receipts were light and prices advanced from \$10 to \$10.50 per cwt. The Davies Packing Company received a consignment of 1000 northwest porkers on Monday, and were expecting another 1000 today from the same source, and still the prices keep climbing.

Choice steers sold at \$8.50 to \$9.50; good loads at \$8.25 to \$8.50; medium to good at \$7.50 to \$8.25; common to medium at \$7.25 to \$7.50; common, light, inferior at \$7; cows, choice at \$7 to \$8; medium to good at \$6.50 to \$7; medium cows at \$6.25 to \$6.50; canners and cutters at \$5 to \$6; bulls at \$4.50 to \$5.

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Milkers and Springers. A limited number of milkers and springers are sold at \$9 to \$9.50 each, and one choice cow brought \$120.

MANY PASSENGERS ON ROYAL GEORGE

High Commissioner's Office Co-Operating in Return of Canadians.

Assurances have been received in Toronto that the high commissioner's office in London is facilitating the return to Canada of the Cuthbert tourist party, and it is expected that the members, including forty from this city, will be able to sail as scheduled by the Royal Edward from Bristol on August 26th. This personally conducted party of first-class passengers sailed from Montreal on the Royal George.

The Royal George, which cleared from Bristol yesterday for Canada, carries a first-class passenger list of 451, a second-class of 210 and a third-class of 190. Amongst these are included many prominent Canadians who have been waiting in England for a ship to carry them back to Canada.

The Royal Edward, of the same line, cleared from Montreal this morning for Bristol. She carried 21 passengers in the first-class, 38 in the second, and 232 in the third. The report that a large number of reservists were on the ship is not officially confirmed at the head office here.

LOWER DEATH RATE.

The death rate per 1000 citizens during July of this year was lower than that of July, 1913, by 1.3 per cent. The rate last month was 10 per cent, and the corresponding month last year it was 11.8 per cent.

BOARD OF TRADE GROWS.

This makes a total of eighty-nine elected since the board announced that new members had been secured in the Royal Bank building, and that in addition to enlarging the general work of the board, luncheon club privileges would be provided for the members in the new premises.
