# THE DICKENS CENTENARY

It was in no small and insignificant manner that the Toronto Branch of the Dickens' Fellowship Club last evening clefrated the centenary of the birth of Charles Dickens, novelist, humanitarian and poet.

Archdeacon Cody in his remarks, as the principal speaker of the evening, asked the question "Will Dickens die?" The memory and appreciation of the great inovelist's writings was marked by the neormous gatheringin fact the aumber present was fifty per cent. larger than was anticipated, and Archdeacon Cody thought that his question, was answered in an undeniable manner by the size of the audience.

Archdeacon Cody attributed the success of Dickens' efforts and the appreciation which his books have been received, to the enormous vitality, vigor and optimism of the author.

Charles Dickens was an optimist and a reformer. A reformer not in ever trying to preach as some do, but in creating a feeling of brotherly love among all mankind, and especially between the rich and poor. He was a character creator, and while he depicts life in nearly every phase, he did not mock or throw stones, he showed up evils, and brought to light the good that lay in the depths of man's heart by playing on his imagination.

Archdeacon Cody in his remarks, referred to te Charles Dickens as a creator not only of characters, but of humor. Before his day, the writers seemed to be devoid of this quality, Good, clean, wholesome humor marked Dickens' books and made them stand out above those of his day, and even now they hold that same pre-eminence.
