

Jockey Cullen Killed  
Jost Fatally Injured  
In Spill at Montreal

Ponies Runched in Fourth Race at King Edward Track, and Veno Von, with Cullen Up, Stumbled, Throwing the Rider—Jost, Mounted on Pony Girl, was Hurled Against a Fence, Breaking His Skull.

MONTREAL, Aug. 18.—(Can. Press.)—A bad spill in the fourth race at King Edward Park yesterday cost the life of Jockey Willie Cullen and Jockey Jost is seriously injured that his recovery is doubtful.

Nine horses started in the race, Jockey Small going out in front on Doll Boy. At the stretch Doll Boy swung wide across the track and Jockey Cullen, who had the mount on Veno Von, came thru the rail. A few strides from the wire the horse stumbled and the rider was thrown, breaking his neck. He died on the way to the hospital.

Jockey Jost, on Pony Girl, immediately behind, had no time to get clear of the mix-up and his horse went down, throwing him heavily. His head struck the fence and his skull was fractured.

The body of Cullen was shipped to Brooklyn, N.Y., where his mother resides, to-night. Jost's father is with his son.

The King Edward Park track is on an island known as Isle Grosbois, some ten miles down the river. The track is a half mile circuit. Yesterday was the opening day of the second meet of the summer held by the King Edward Park Jockey Club.
