

generous, and he would be ashamed if they were not spending more and more money, so long as they were getting good value. A great deal must be left to the agricultural turn of education. He was not a worshipper of regulations, and held that inspectors and teachers should not be so much the slave of the letter as to destroy the spirit. (Applause.) Whenever an inspector is appointed, Dr. Cody tells him he is first a man and a brother of the teacher, and only a filler-in of reports in a secondary way. In the nature of the case, however, there must be regulations. They cannot be got rid of, but in coming to the house that the department would not be the slave of the system. The text-books have a powerful influence upon education. The teacher, however, must know a great deal more than the text book into his hands.

The leading feature of the present educational program is the teacher and his training. The teacher is the school. Salaries have increased in the last ten years. In elementary schools increases occur practically every year, and also a steady increase in the number holding higher certificates. The total amount of salaries had increased from about \$4,000,000 to \$8,000,000, or 91 per cent. In elementary school the salary increases figured at 87 per cent. Additional efforts have been made to make practical education more attractive.

Library Training.
All teachers in the normal schools will get a short course of training in the management of libraries. Increased attention will be given to the social life of the girls in the normal schools. Plant laboratories are assigned to aid in the teaching of agriculture, and it is proposed to separate the teacher training from that of technical and industrial training. More attention must be given to training for high and continuation schools. The state can never divorce itself from responsibility for training teachers for the schools. The training of returned soldiers is highly important. The necessary academic standing will be provided for these schools, which will have agricultural grounds of ten or fifteen acres. The minister of education must approve of all combinations for consolidated school purposes. An element of permanence must be introduced.

FEDERAL REVENUE EXCEEDS ESTIMATE
Budget of Sir Thomas to Show Revenue Thirty-Five Millions More Than Expected.

Ottawa, April 8.—When Sir Thomas White presents his budget to the house he will be able to announce a revenue for the year which closed at the end of March well in excess of the estimate. In the last budget revenue was estimated at \$270,000,000. The monthly statement issued by the finance department shows that revenues collected during the fiscal year total \$305,230,000, or thirty-five million dollars over the estimate, and fifty-three million dollars over the revenue collected in the previous fiscal year. This revenue, the greatest increase since the head of miscellaneous income, practically all collected by way of direct taxation, such as income tax and profits tax. As compared with the previous year, the yield of miscellaneous revenue has practically doubled. In 1917-18 it was \$24,408,000. In 1918-19 it was \$68,824,000.

War Expenditure during the year was \$347,824,000, an increase of approximately forty-seven million dollars over the previous year. Out of the surplus of ordinary revenue, over ordinary and capital expenditure (less war) about twenty-six per cent, practically the same percentage as in the previous year, has been available in the previous year, although the war expenditure has been forty-seven million dollars greater. Revenues from customs and excise are growing in spite of prohibition. During the year, customs brought in \$147,000,000, an increase of \$30,011,000. In the previous year, the revenues were: Customs, \$143,311,000. Excise, \$36,670,000. The postoffice is the only revenue which shows a reduction. It decreased during the year by about six hundred thousand dollars. Ordinary expenditure was increased by approximately fifty-four million dollars. Within the last twelve months, the net debt of the Dominion has grown from \$1,106,394,000 to \$1,458,377,000.

The Knights of Columbus Club, corner of King and John streets, which since its formation has been working for the benefit of the returned veterans, has announced that it will start a movie show in the club building.

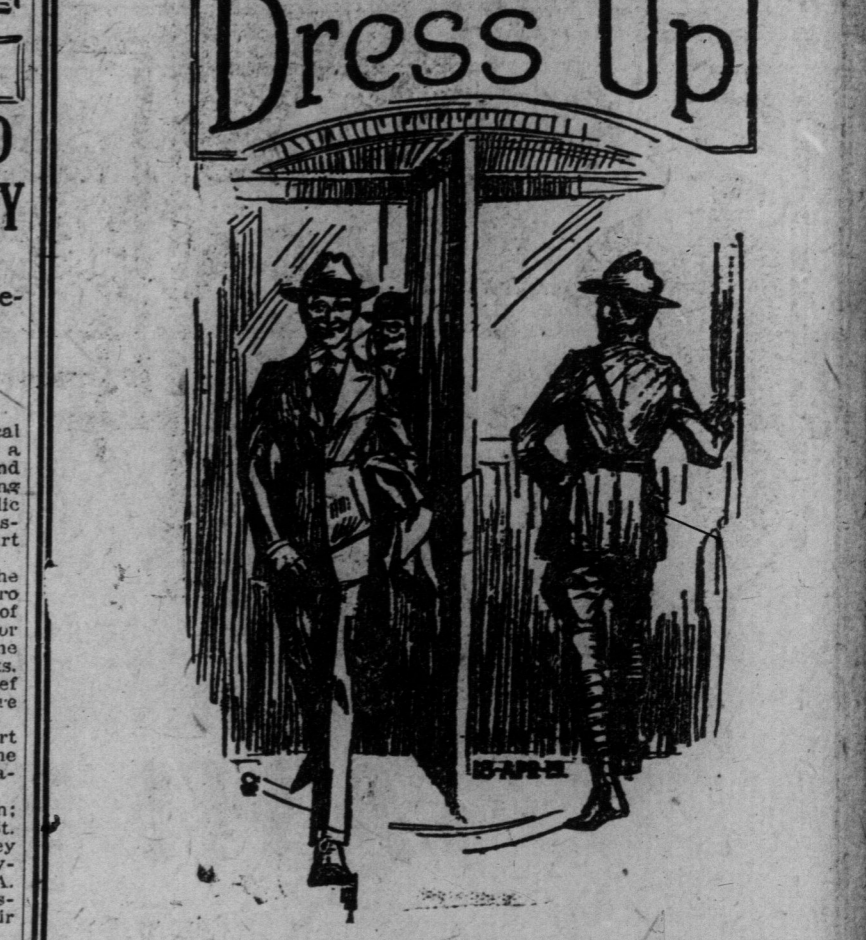
