MATCHEWAN AREA SCENE OF ACTIVITY

Much Ground Staked Out by Prospectors, and Samples Show Good Values.

Special to The Toronto World. Matchewan, Aug. 31.—The Matchewan gold mine has started a second shaft, 225 feet north-easterly from their present workings. This is merely by way of exploring additional ground, not because of unsatisfactory results in the old shaft. However, in my judgment, conditions at the new shaft are better than at the old. In fact, it is questionable whether in any part of Ontario there is a formation more favorable for gold than the mineralization of the Matchewan area. The auriferous zone is said to extend for 200 feet, and is nearly 100 feet in width. The authorities at the mine are not giving out any information. The light but the phenocrysts are showing, so far as the surface is concerned, cannot very well be concealed. There are quartz veins visible, but an enormous mass of rock that has quartz-veins, the auriferous "juice" from the quartz-veins, nearby. At present it looks like the biggest proposition in Ontario, if not in the world.

JUNE EXPORT FIGURES FOR PULP AND PAPER

June exports of paper, pulp and pulpwad from Canada, totaled in value, \$7,245,851, as compared with \$9,120,192 in June last year. Paper shows a gain of \$13,538 and mechanically ground pulp of \$25,818 while chemically prepared pulp fell off \$1,105,532, and unmanufactured pulpwad, \$1,113,114.

B. R. Paine, a prominent mining engineer of New York, has been in the Matchewan area, mainly for connection with the Matchewan gold mine (Ollase).
