**Aid in Saving Women's Lives at
Blackwell's Island Fire.**

New York, Dec. 20.—Men forgot that
they were convicts and remembered
only that they were men on Blackwell's
Island early this morning, when the
male prisoners, marshalled by their
keepers into a fire-fighting and life-
saving corps, bore from the flaming
floors of the women's wards 594 frantic
women and from the hospital 50 men.
Starting in the sewing-room of the
workhouse and from a cause which has
not yet been definitely decided, the fire
had reached a fearful stage at 2 o'clock
when it was discovered.

On the top floor were cells for the
women and every one of the one or two
prisoners when the fire occurred. The
women became frantic with fright and
were soon sinking with the dousing of
water. The men, however, were the first
that filled all the halls and their cells.
