TWO ARE DEAD AND SEVERAL INJURED FIREMEN AND POLICE DO GALLANT WORK EARLY MORNING YORK STREET FIRE

Aaron Ornstein's Wife and 5 Year Old Child Victims of Smoke and Flame—Several Other Occupants Jump From Windows.

FIREMEN CARRY OUT FOUR FROM UPSTAIRS CORRIDORS

One woman and one child are dead, and two men may die owing to burns, suffocation and shock sustained at a fire which broke out in Aaron Ornstein's tailor shop at 156 York-street, shortly after 3 o'clock Sunday morning. The dead are his wife and 5-year-old girl, the latter dying soon after being removed to the hospital, and the woman about 1 o'clock this morning. The cause of the fire is unknown, but it originated in the rear of the store, and beneath the stairs leading to the floors above, where the victims were sleeping. The building is a three-story brick, in the heart of the Jewish quarter.

Ornstein, who had been at work cleaning up his shop for the week-end, was awakened by fumes of smoke in his room at the rear of the first floor of the building. He endeavored to arouse the remaining 11 inmates. Just what did happen during the next few minutes it is hard to say. One story is that he, with his 3-year-old boy, clambered upstairs, and that he aroused two young women in the third floor back room, and asked them to save the child. They tried to get the mattress and pillows from the bed thru the window, but could not, and then, frightened, they leaped 20 feet or more to the metal roof of a shed. Whether Ornstein then threw the child to the girls below to catch, and then jumped, or whether he got down again to his own room and then out of the window, it is not certain, but the four were found in the yard in the rear by the firemen, the girls in scant attire, while Ornstein was partly dressed. He was found screaming with terror. The girls had also fallen from the shed to the ground, some ten feet.

P. C. Latremouille was on York-street when he saw the rear of the store in flames. He hurried to sound an alarm. P. C. McNeil then struck in from King and York-street. Latremouille ran back and saw two men, Schwartz and Greenfield, at the third floor window, where they had leaped. He shouted to them to keep their heads and not to jump, but help would soon be at hand. Scarcely had the words left his lips when either misunderstanding or crazed with fear Greenfield leaped from the window, striking the sidewalk with such force that he smashed both feet. The other, quickly following him came Schwartz, who also is severely hurt.

The alarm was turned at 3:28 a.m. The Bay-street hose wagon and ladder truck were first to arrive. Owing to York-street being torn up for water mains they had to run down King-street instead of Adelaide, as they generally do. In this way they turned up York-street, the flames were bursting out the lower window over the sidewalk. Two men were prostrate on the ground, the one Greenfield, his condition attempting to crawl across the street.


No one made any mention of any one being in danger and the men started in to extinguish the flames. The smoke was very dense. The firemen believe that 5 minutes were lost before assistance was obtained. P. C. McNeil, who hastened around to the rear, learned from Ornstein, who was in a great state of frenzy, that there were people in the upper floors. District Chief Smedley rushed around to the front and told Deputy Chief Noble, who directed ladders to be run up to the two front windows.

Fireman Al Everest of hose 16 mounted to the second floor and entered the room. He located Fierstein, who had evidently descended from above in an effort to get out. Lieut. Davidson of Bay-street truck went to the third floor and found Mrs. Fierstein carrying her downstairs and to a neighboring house.

Deputy Chief Noble led the way thru the store, and the flames were still fierce and the smoke and heat fearful, headed a number of men from Bay and Lombard-street stations to the upper floors. George Henderson of hose 1 distinguished himself. Crawling on his hands and knees he got into the second floor hall bedroom. He felt on the floor and over the bed, and then with the glare of the flames to help, peered under the bed. There he found the baby. He hurried into the street with the child and across the street, where he used artificial respiration until life was assured. Meanwhile the deputy with Firemen Gates, Williams, McGregor, Best, Harris, Smith, Oliver, McGregor, Caskie and others struggled up thru the suffocating fumes to the third floor. There Mrs. Ornstein and Ernstein were found apparently lifeless, Ernstein being in his room with his wife. They were promptly and tenderly carried down into the open air. A minute later Fireman Fred Bird and P. C. W. J. Smith found poor little Jennie, who, in some manner, had fallen down between the bed and the wall to the upper room. She was taken down to the sidewalk, where P. C. McNeil at began a mighty effort to save her life.

DECIDED AGAINST MURDER BUT TAKES HIS OWN LIFE

William Lynch's Argument With Friend Would Indicate That He Had Contemplated an Attack on His Wife.

"Will God deal more leniently with the murderer or the suicide at the judgment day?" This question was thrashed out by William Lynch with his roommate, James Hadfield, at his room at 27 Mercer-street, Saturday night. The proposition was discussed impersonally. Hadfield said that he believed the suicide had the better chance. Lynch blew out his brains Sunday morning. Discord with his wife was the primal cause of the deed. Mrs. Lynch secured an order of separation in police court last Friday.

A few minutes later two men in the next room, heard a muffled shout. They paid no attention to it until Hadfield returned, shortly after 10 o'clock. Pushing the door open to enter his room, it struck the prostrate form of Lynch. There was a bullet hole in his right temple and a 35-calibre Smith & Wesson revolver with one empty shell in the cylinder lay close beside the body. The man had evidently stood before the mirror when he fired. Dr. G. E. Smith, 389 West King-street, was called, but the man had died instantly. Chief Coroner A. J.
