**DEATH OF MR. GEO. M. ROSE**

The Well-Known Toronto Publisher Passed Away Yesterday Morning.

He Had Been a Sufferer for Several Months and the End Was Not Unexpected—Sketch of His Active Career as Printer and Publisher.

Mr. George Maclean Rose, head of the well-known publishing firm of Hunter, Rose & Co., Toronto, died at an early hour yesterday morning at his residence, 97 St. Joseph-street.

Deceased, who for several months had been in poor health, succumbed to an attack of paralysis. The end was not unexpected, and nearly all the members of the family were present. As late as Christmas time deceased paid a visit to the publishing office, though very feeble. His medical attendants were Drs. Davidson and Myers.

**Brief Biography.**

George Maclean Rose was born in Wick, Calthnesshire, on March 14, 1829. After leaving school he entered the office of John Frost Journal in 1850. He accepted a position on the Northern Eastern. In this position he was employed for several years, until he came to Toronto, where he was employed by his brother Henry, he started a job printing office.

**JAPAN KEEPS WEL-HAI-WEL**

China could not raise the cash and therefore the "straggler" has been "forclosed."

Paris, Feb. 10.—Official advices received by the Foreign Office from Peking state that Japan has notified China that she intends to keep Wel-Hai-Wel permanently. China, in notifying the Chinese Ministers abroad to this effect, directs them to notify the powers also that, in view of this, no foreign loan is required, as the purpose of the loan was solely to pay the Japanese war indemnity.
