DEATH OF MR. GEO. M. ROSE

The Well-Known Toronto Publisher Passed Away Yesterday Morning.

He Had Been a Sufferer for Several Months and the End Was Not Unexpected-Sketch of His Active Career as Printer

Mr. George Maclean Rose, head of the well-known publishing firm of Hunter Rose & Co., Toronto, died at an early hour

He asked the court if it would accept the evidence of Robt. Douglas as opposed to that of the two Thompsons.


The learned counsed asked His Lordship to simply suppress the personality of the witnesses and not to take their evidence at all. At length he dealt with the estimate of their departments.

I think we may stamp him as belonging to the unreliable class, my lord. We have come across some currostities in literature in his evidence. In regard to Mr. T. C. Thompson, Your Lordship never had before you such honesty of purpose, intelligence and knowledge of the subject on which he was asked to speak."

Mr. Blake went through a great deal or former testimony given by both sides of the case to corroborate his view and in summing up said: "I say it is impossible, my lord, for any judge or any jury to gainsay the fact of the goods being there at the time, and I trust Your Lordship will find there will be nothing to the contrary, as I am only taking the defendant's witness that the stock was as great at the period of the fire as at the time of stock taking."
