WHO IS TO BLAME FOR HIS HUMANITY?

Last Days of Macdonald and Fraser Must Have Been Simply Terrible.

IT WAS WORSE THAN MURDER

The Manner in Which These Men on the Crow's Nest Construction Were Treated When Ill.

NO EXCUSE FOR SUCH NEGLECT.

Commissioner Clute Sends a Report Which Ought to Make Some People Bow in Shame.

Ottawa, May 18.—(Special.)—Sir Wilfrid Laurier this afternoon laid on the table of the House the report of Mr. B. C. Clute, Q.C., the commissioner appointed to enquire into the circumstances of the death of Fraser and Macdonald during the construction of the Crow's Nest Pass Railway. It is stated in the commission, a copy of which is attached to the report, that the enquiry was to be conducted with a view to establishing whether there was criminal negligence on the part of any person or persons, resulting in the death of the men.

Press Reports Were True.

Mr. Clute appears to have made a very thorough examination and his report, with the evidence taken, and his findings and recommendations cover over four hundred typewritten pages. He says that he visited the works examined about sixty witnesses, whose evidence is given, and which gives the details of the men's work and death. It is noted that he was given in the press at the time and as brought out in the House last year.

Medical System Inadequate.

The conclusion he arrives at, briefly summarized, is that the medical system on the Crow's Nest Pass Railway was absolutely inadequate, and that the death of Fraser and Macdonald was absolutely avoidable. He also condemns the inhumanity of the men during the men's stay at the fifth siding.
