London, April 6.-The House of Commons was crowded with people anxious to hear Mr. Balfour's statement of the situation in the far east. Mr. Balfour enumerated the concession obtained by Great Britain, as follows: That the region of the Yang Tse Kiang should not be allenated by any foreign power; that the successor of Sir Robert Hart, as director of the Chinese imperial maritime customs, is to be an Englishman, and that access to the inland waters is to be had by ships of all nations. A fourth concession occurred a day or two ago, namely, the opening of three new treaty ports—Fu Ning, Ye Chau and Chin Wang. This, according to Mr. Balfour, was a considerable har-

vest for two months' negotiations. GERMANY'S ACQUISITIONS.
