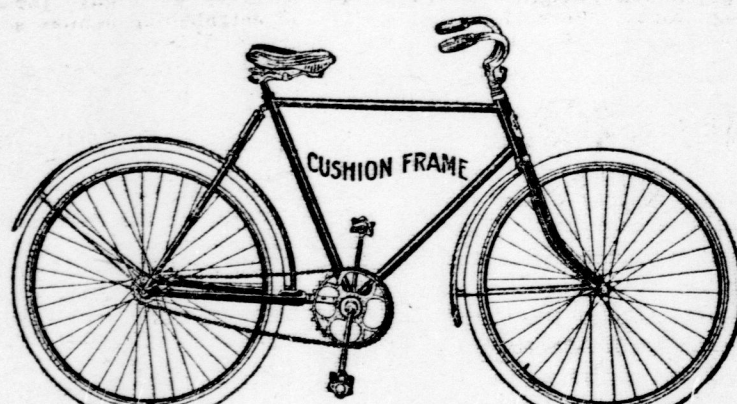

Western Towns' Enterprise.

Have Installed Electric Light Plants and Waterworks Systems.

Strathcona, Alta., May 4. — An illustration of the progressive spirit which prevails in western towns, it is only necessary to point to the modern electric light plant and waterworks system recently installed in this place. The contract was filled by the Canadian General Electric Company, and it is conceded on every hand that in design the installation is equal to any, and superior to many, of the eastern plants. Each of the two deep well pumps and two condenser pumps, made by the Canada Foundry Company, which operate the waterworks system. There are two generators, one of 200 K.W. capacity and one of 70 K.W. capacity, each directly connected to an engine. The generator panels are of blue Vermont marble. The Canadian General Electric Company made a similar installation at Indian Head, and in each case they have proved so satisfactory that it is altogether probable that many other towns will follow the example set by these enterprising corporations.

DEMANDS SCOTT'S ARREST.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:

I read with interest the letter of the senior Attwood in last Saturday's issue of The Advertiser regarding the case of his son and grandchild. I was sorry to see that he takes Friend Mitchell's view of the case, "Let them go and let the Devil go with them." Doubtless he has; but whatever the other two may do, not having a warrant against him, he will be soon back to Ontario again. True, as the senior Attwood says, there is a warrant resting against Scott which is good for all time to come, and in the end he will show up again in Ontario he will be snatched up like a June bug, and he rests his hopes that the warrant will keep him away.

That view of the case may be well as far as the Attwoods are concerned, but this is a most flagrant breach of law and protection, which the public is interested in, and I think the public demands the arrest and punishment of Scott as he deserves.

We glory in the fact that we are a law-abiding people; we pay taxes to support a police force for the protection of ourselves, our homes and property; but if a man is allowed to molest a wife's affection, thereby destroying domestic comfort, and in company with two other thugs, breaks into a man's house at midnight, grab him while he is asleep and by threats that if he makes the least noise it will be worse for him, tie him hand and foot with hands behind his back, and in addition tie him to the bedstead, abduct his wife and her child, together with two trunks full of clothing and other stuff, silverware, etc., and do it all with impunity, what is the good of our boasted British protection? We might as well dismiss our police and trust in future to Judge Lynch. "Oh," they will say, "we are hunting for him."

Well, if they run against him I suppose he will be arrested; but are they hunting very much? If they were they could easily get hold of him. From Detroit he was checked to Bay City, which is not 200 miles distant. He is doubtless there, or somewhere not far distant.

Scott's crime is an extraordinary offense, and the public demands his arrest. If he is let go free, what account have they that the like will not be repeated. Are thugs to be allowed to enter our homes at any time, tie us up or knock us in the head, abduct our wives or daughters, take them across the line, keep them a certain

TO QUIT UNION PACIFIC

Wall Street Hears That Harriman is About to Resign.

New York, May 6. — The sharp advance in Union Pacific, more notable because it followed a decided advance last week, today was accompanied by reports that, if true, will have an important bearing on Union Pacific affairs. According to one report, E. H. Harriman is about to resign as president of the company and another story had it that plans for the organization of a holding company, to take over the Union Pacific's investments and other roads, are practically complete.

E. H. Harriman refused to discuss either report. There is a conference in his office today, but it is believed that it was not on such an important question as the retirement of Mr. Harriman, for neither Henry H. Rogers, Henry C. Frick, William Rockefeller, nor James Stillman was present.

In banking circles close to the Harriman party the report of Harriman's retirement was discredited. As a matter of fact, it was said, it has not been seriously considered by the members of the so-called Harriman party since the Roosevelt-Harriman imbroglio. It was said that Harriman's retirement at this time would be taken as a Roosevelt victory.

Before the interstate commerce investigation the idea of forming a company to hold the stocks of other roads was well thought of, and it is believed in many well informed quarters that the holding company is to be organized within a few weeks. The belief is equally as strong that the holding company will borrow heavily, with its stock as collateral, as soon as it is formally launched.
