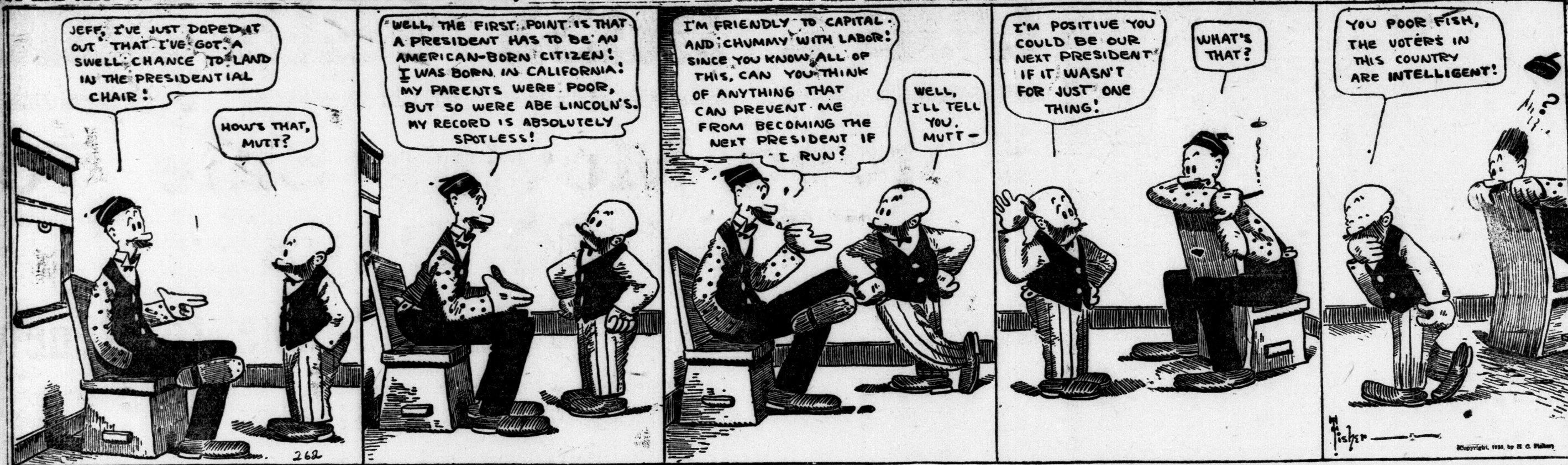

Battle Creek Club To Get Another Chance in M. O.

Port Huron Has No Park and Pontiac Isn't Improvement On Surface, So New Management Is Looked To To Buck Up Situation—Halligan's Line On New Pitcher.

PLANT, Mich., June 18.—From what can be gathered from official circles it would appear that Custerville will hang onto the franchise in the M. O. League and let the other would-be bidders for the claim go blank. With the appointment of Bill Shipley to hold the Custers it looks like a go ahead. Advice to Flint from Port Huron says to the effect that that city is not likely to spend any huge sum of money to provide a regulation park for M. O. baseball. It seems to "be off" so far as Port Huron is concerned. Pontiac might do so. Pontiac, is not, however, the logical landing place. Port Huron is the proper spot if Port Huron has the park room. But without park facilities it would be all folly, the big heads admit, to seek to launch the sinking ship in that yard.

There's a tendency to let Battle Creek alone for a while and see what the new management will do. What Pontiac needs most just now, say those in closest touch, is publicity. Trios of Triples Rare But Happen—Ask Hod Eller!

Not Since 1900 Until Tuesday, May 11, Has Stunt Been Done—In Old Days of National, Bill Joyce of Giants Swatted Four.

When, on Tuesday, May 11, Ross Young of the Giants leaped on Ned Eller of the Reds for a trio of triples, he did something out of the ordinary, for the list of National League players who have turned this trick since the parent organization got back to common sense and an eight-circuit, is not a large one. Back in the days when the National was operating with a dozen clubs, Scrappy Bill Joyce of the Giants arose one afternoon and smote four three-baggers, but since 1900 three triples in one combat has been the limit for batters in the National.

The Giants lost the game in which Young blasted his three triples on the basis of 4 to 4, Ross of Texas batting against Eller four times and only once failing to come through with a safety. In the fifth the New York right fielder popped to Bill Kopf, Red shortstop.

On his other three trips to the plate, Young, called each blow being called left. George Burns was on the run—way when Young batted in the first and easily scored. In the third Young was the first hitter of the inning, so, of course, he had no chance to score anyone with his three-ply wallop, being pushed over the plate on Fletcher's sacrifice fly.

In the fifth, as before related, Young popped out to Shortstop Kopf. But in the seventh he resumed his habit of slugging three-baggers to left and his last blow in the eighth was a three-bagger. The Giant coacher on third wiggled the information to Young that his hit was worth four bases and he was in error in this point, Ross being nailed at the plate.

Second Time in Career.

This was the second time in Young's career he had assembled three long blows in one fracas, the other occasion being in October, 1917, when Ross got to Joe Oeschger, then of the Phillies, now of the Braves, for a double and a grand slam.
