# ALLIES MAY BE FORCED TO MAKE WAR ON BOLSHEVIKI IN ORDER TO SAVE POLAND

Lloyd George Tells Parliamen t That Situation Is Extremely Critical and That Allied Soldiers May Soon Be Sent To Aid of Polish Forces-L abor Party Strongly Criticizes Government For Failing To Take Measures To Prevent Poles From Attacking Russian Reds in First Place-Germany May Find Open ing To Embarrass Entente.

London, July 23.—The British public is disturbed by the possibility confronting it that the Allies may be compelled to enter another European war to save Poland. This position was made plain by Premier Lloyd George's speech in the House of Commons Wednesday, and all the newspapers are speculating upon it. Heretofore the impression has been that Britain's part if Poland were faced with invasion by the Bolsheviki, as it how appears to be faced, would be limited to furnishing munitions. Mr. Lloyd George's statement that Great Britain is bound to give every assistance in her power to save Poland and that he may be compelled to "place the whole position before Parliament," however, is interpreted to mean much more than that.

# WILL DISCUSS SUBWAY PLANS

Crossings To Be Considered Tonight. \*-

Subways for Rectory and Waterloo treets will be discussed tonight by a special committee of the city council, of which Ald. Cameron Wilson is chair man, Reports on the project will be submitted by the G. T. R. engineering department and by City Engineer Brazier. Mr. Brazier just completed the final details of his report today. His plans will also include an overhead bridge for Egerton street.

Provision of a subway at Rectory street is expected to be a fairly easy matter, but the Waterloo street proposal presents a more difficult problem.

Efforts to secure a number of building lots owned by the city in connection with the Pine Lawn development are being made by a large firm of contractors and builders, it was learned today. The housing commission purchased the Homister homestead, near the Hamilton road ,and commenced its development as a building site. The possibilities of development have been realized by the builders, and they are department and by City Engineer Bra

matter, but the Waterloo street proposal presents a more difficult problem. There is a wide stretch of G. T. R. tracks here, and in addition to the difculty presented by this fact there is the London and Port Stanley track a few hundred feet south. If a subway is built under the G. T. R. tracks it will open almost directly onto the track of the city line. This, at is claimed, would be more dangerous than a level crossing. If the subway is to be extended beneath the L. and P. S. R. track, however, it will be a very long one and will be expensive.

Another suggestion of the committee was that Thames street be paved so that more traffic would be diverted to that street and through the subway already existing there. Both the street and the subway are very narrow and the city engineer advised against increasing the traffic particularly as it would throw an additional burden on the Ridout street bridge, which is in a weakened condition.

# GT. BRITAIN MUST GAIN IN IRELAND, ALTHOUGH BELFAST RIOTS MEAN SACRIFICE OF

Shooting Is Renewed This Sir Hamar Greenwood, Chief Secretary of Ireland, in Address Before British Parliament, Calls For More Drastic Measures To Meet the Reign of Murder Now Prevailing-Predicts Situation Will Become Much Worse and Appeals To Ali To Support British Government in Any Action It May Take.

> London. July 23.—'I regret having to say that Parliament and the Kingdom must brace itself to face a bitter period in Irish history, as there will be a determined effort to establish an Irish republic by means of murder and intimidation," declared Sir Hamar Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, in the course of a debate on Irish affairs in the Commons yesterday. He appealed to all parties and creeds to support the crown. all parties and creeds to support Government, predicting the situation would become still worse than at pres-

"There never was a time," he added, "There never was a time," he added, "when the Irish executive, the British cabinet and the House of Commons were more desirous of settling this agelong Irish question, and we welcome representations from every quarter as to the best method for solution."

For the present, Sir Hamar said, he would have to ask the House to pass certain legislative measures to meet the situation, among them one to create a situation, among them one to create a tribunal superseding civil courts, which had failed to function during the recent assizes, and another empowering the lord lieutenant of Ireland to establish a tribunal to deal quickly with all criminal offences committed in Ireland.
