ALLIES MAY BE FORCED TO MAKE WAR ON BOLSHEVIKI IN ORDER TO SAVE POLAND

Lloyd George Tells Parliament That Situation Is Extremely Critical and That Allied Soldiers May Soon Be Sent To Aid of Polish Forces—L. Party Strongly Criticizes Government For Failing To Take Measures To Prevent Poles From Attacking Russian Reds in First Place—Germany May Find Opening To Embarrass Entente.

London, July 23.—The British public is disturbed by the possibility of a conflict with the Allies may be compelled to enter another European war to save Poland. This position was made plain by Premier Lloyd George's speech in the House of Commons Wednesday, and all the newspapers are speculating upon it. Heretofore the impression has been that Britain's part in Poland was faced with invasion by the Bolsheviks, as it now appears to be faced, would be limited to furnishing munitions. Mr. Lloyd George's statement that Great Britain is bound to save Poland and that he may be compelled to "place the whole position before Parliament" has been interpreted to mean much more than that.

RESOLUTE S LEADING IN TODAY'S RACE

American Defender Gets Away First in Fourth Event. LIGHT WIND PREVAILS

U. S. Racer Rounds First Mark Nearly Two Minutes Ahead of Challenger.

Resolute led at first mark 1 minute 48 seconds, official time. At 3200 the yachts were within two miles the second turn, with the Resolute leading by half a mile.

MORE THAN A MILLION DOLLARS WORTH OF LONDON PROPERTY IS CHANGING HANDS MONTHLY

Transactions Are Almost Entirely Residential Real Estate—Comparison of Prices Shows Big Jump in Values.

More than a million dollars' worth of property is changing hands each month in London, according to an official report on property transactions issued from the office of Assessor General Grant today. This is based on the records of April and May. The sudden increase in the sale of property threw the department far behind in its work.

Assessor Harry Bennett, who compiled the figures, stated that the sales were confined almost entirely to small residential property. "I do not think there are a dozen vacant lots in all the property that has changed hands," he said.

Prices are high. The sales in April numbered 366, for which \$955,822 was paid. The assessment on these was \$747,831. In April, 1918, there were only 72 sales, representing a cash value of \$98,221, and an assessment of \$11,485.

May holds the record. The sales in May numbered 388 pieces of property changing hands, for which \$1,050,008 was paid. In May, 1918, there were 91 transfers, for which \$136,220 was paid, and on which the assessment was \$204,730.
