CONDITION IN EUROPE IS BAD AS DEPICTED, SAYS MISS WINDSOR

Canadian Red Cross To Make General Appeal On Armistice Day.

Miss Windsor of the British Empire War Relief Fund, presented a strong appeal for help for the suffering peoples of the European countries, at a special meeting of the Red Cross Society held yesterday afternoon in the Western Fair board rooms. Her appeal was rather the explanation of conditions in Europe, given by one who has herself investigated the facts and visited the countries. It comes as a preliminary to the big general appeal to be made throughout Canada on Armistice Day. Accompanying her to the city was M. D. Williams of the Dominion Red Cross headquarters at Toronto.

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"If the whole world knew that things were as bad in Europe as they really are, there would be no question about the whole world getting together to try and help," she declared. "But the trouble is that the greater part of the world is so far removed from the countries suffering from the effects of the war, that it does not realize what is going on there. I didn't believe it until I saw it with my own eyes, and now I come to try and make you see it, too."

Visited by Motor.

The speaker, who travelled by motor throughout Czechoslovakia, Hungary and Poland, found the people most destitute of food and clothing. In Hungary, she found splendid home organization for relief work, which was being carried on as satisfactorily as conditions would permit, but those conditions making it pitifully limited. In Czechoslovakia there was also some sort of active relief work, but in Poland, she found the people absolutely dependent on help from outside. Here, as everywhere, there was not a single lack of clothes, food and cleaning materials.

Speaking of Czechoslovakia, she said:

"The black bread is so hard, that often I find the children are unable to eat it. Before they could offer it to their small children. With such a standard of living as prevailed in this district, indeed, it is much lower than that of Africa, which I also know something. Soap cannot be got. The people live in filthy little huts with no beds, and no mattresses or bedding; their food is hard coarse black bread with some milk and butter, or bread or milk, so necessary for the development of the children. A condition of rickets is found everywhere among the children."
