Canadian Who Shot American Constable in Hospital Here

Minneapolis Officer of Law in Precarious Condition as Result of Mental Delusion on Part of Toronto Man.

Assistant Medical Superintendent Dr. W. T. B. Mitchell of the Westminster Military Psychiatric Hospital here, and Chief Attendant G. Murdoch of the same institution, returned from Minneapolis last week with a dangerous patient who is a discharged Canadian soldier, shot a Minneapolis police constable in the month, two weeks ago while laboring under a mental delusion and the courts there notified the Canadian authorities, with the result that the man will be confined to the hospital here for treatment.

The veteran, who is a Toronto man, and whose name is withheld, was shot in the back of the head, and the bullet entered his brain. He was taken to the hospital here, and after a short stay, he was transferred to a mental institution in the vicinity of Minneapolis. PANIC REIGNED AS PASSENGERS FOUGHT TO GET INTO LIFEBOATS

Survivor From Wreck of Spanish Steamer Relates Experiences.

BOATS OVERTURNED Steamer Left in Darkness With Land Only 300 Yards Distant.

Coruna, Spain, Jan. 7.—The first comprehensive narrative of the wreck of the Spanish steamer Santa Isabel, in which more than 200 persons perished, was given yesterday to the Associated Press by Pedro Fal, a pilot living at Buenos Ayres, who was a passenger on board the vessel with his wife. They were returning to Argentina, accompanied by Luis Maide, the brother of Fal's wife, and proprietor of a department store in Buenos Ayres.

The captain tried to calm the passengers, but without success. Boats were lowered from the deck, and the electric lights failed, owing to the flooding of the machinery room when the engine opened the valves to avoid an explosion. The wireless operator was unable to reply to inquiries relative to the position of the ship.

Panic increased. The obscurity and fog increased the panic of the passengers. The launch was only 300 yards away. At that moment, the launch was struck by a wave, and the passengers were thrown overboard. The launch was overturned, and the passengers were unable to get out.

Lord Mayor of Cork Tells of Trip Across.

WAS PUT TO WORK Peter MacSwiney Found First Provided Him With Food.

Norfolk, Va., Jan. 7.—The story of how he had boarded the steamer West Cork for his secret passage to this country was told by Daniel O'Callaghan, lord mayor of Cork, who came here last night from New York. He was accompanied by Peter MacSwiney, brother of the late lord mayor.

Getting aboard ship was not as difficult as it may seem. O'Callaghan said, "Dressed as a laborer, I hung around the quays for about an hour watching my chance. Many of the crew were absent from the ship, and when I saw my chance I climbed a ladder and slipped aboard in the hold."

He added that MacSwiney had boarded the ship ahead of him. After boarding ship, O'Callaghan said, he remained concealed in the hold for several days in a bunker until driven out by sickness. MacSwiney also was a stow-away for three days, he said, but finally came out of hiding and was put to work in the forecastle.

Through him O'Callaghan said, he received food for four days. When MacSwiney made his presence known, calling himself Mulligan, our small stock of food was about gone, O'Callaghan continued. (Copyrighted.)—The weather vagaries of the midwest winter Northern Ontario has experienced for some years are likely to still further delay the arrival of the Canadian National Railway line of the United States balloonists, who are slowly heading for their native land, after landing from their dirigible on the shores of James Bay. Overnight, following a temporary lapse to something like regular winter, as experienced in the northland, snow again commenced to fall, and this morning was still coming down steadily, with a milder temperature prevailing.

Storm is Predicted. W. McDougall Douglas, who is agent here for Revillon Freres, the fur trading company operating in the north, and who is also keeper of the records for the Dominion Meteorological Bureau, said this morning that all indications pointed to a severe storm. With the barometer falling steadily and with the wind persisting in the south, snow is likely to come down for the greater part of the day, and the storm winds of very considerable proportions before evening. At the time of writing, the snow is of the fine, soft variety, and in addition to that which has already fallen is certain to make the trails still more difficult to travel.

According to a report from Grant, 255 miles west of Cochrane, it was raining here early this morning. The thermometer here is at 22 above zero, while time there is no further news of the storm.

COMMUNIST MOVEMENT IN GEORGIA SUPPRESSED. Batumi, Jan. 7.—Danger of a Bolshevik uprising in the Republic of Georgia has been averted, for a time at least, it is said, by allied officers here. The communist movement has been stamped out, it is said, and 1,000 communists have been expelled from the Province of Koutais, north of this city. The Bolsheviks, for political reasons, delayed their proposed attack on Georgia, and the British government took advantage of the opportunity to take precautions against internal strife.
