## Canadian Who Shot American Constable In Hospital Here

Minneapolis Officer of Law in Precarious Condition as Result of Mental Delusion on Part of Toronto Man.

Assistant Medical Superintendent Dr. W. T. B. Mitchell of the Westminster Military Psyopathic Hospital here, and Chief Attendant G. Murdock of the same institution, returned from Minneapolis last week with a dangerous patient who was handed over to them by the police of the above city. The patient, who is a discharged Canadian soldier, shot a Minneapolis police constable in the mouth, two weeks ago, while laboring under a mental delusion and the courts there notified the Canadian authorities, with the result that the man will be contined to It that the man will be confined to hospital here for treatment. the hospital here for treatment.

The veteran, who is a Toronto man, and whose name is withheld, was shell shocked in France, and attacks of insanity are periodic in his case. Some time ago he left the Queen City under the impression that he was being followed, and according to his own story, walked to thet border, ultimately arriving in St. Paul. Possessing funds he was not forced to beg food, but was always in a hurry lest the imaginary foe on his trail should catch up.

Obsession Grew.

The obsession grew upon him in St. Paul, and he obtained a revolver determined to kill his Nemesis. Finally his antics landed him in a St. Paul hospital, and later he was transferred to a mental institute in the nearby city of Minneapolis. The nurse on the ward which the Canadian was quartered discovered that he had a revolver uncer his pillow, and she notified the police.

amination was made, he was ordered to be given into the custody of the Canadian authorities. Dr. Mitchell and Chief Attendant. Murdock, journeyed to Minneapolis for the man, and he is now locked in the Military hospital Without Handcuffs. Without Handcuffs.

A feature of the patient's demeanor is the fact that throughout the entire journey from Minneapolis to London, it was not necessary to handcuff him as at no time was he violent. This is explained by the fact that the patient is satisfied now, believing that he killed the constable, whom he declares has chased him for months. This is cited as an example of his present intelligence, but how long this model behavior will continue, is a mystery which will only be solved by close observation by the hospital authorities.
