Trials at Woodbine The Track

Note and Comment

P. T. Powers, president of the Eastern Baseball League and general manager of the Toronto team, was in Toronto on Saturday to look into the conditions and intention of his proteges, Tom Longboat. They were interested spectators at the island race which had aided in making P.T. famous.

The versatile impresario declared that the best grounds at Hamilton's Point were all well matched, he preferred to take Marathon.

Mr. Powers has given his consent to Longboat running next Saturday in Montreal against Alfred Shrubbs, on condition that his (Powers) half of the Indian's bill goes to a specified charity. Asked about the subsequent twenty miles race, in Toronto, Manager Powers directed the enquirer to H. H. Dewar, K.C., to whom all legal entanglements concerning Longboat had been referred.

Longboat left Sunday night for Montreal, along with Mr. Little, who is promoting the race, and Tim O'Rourke. Those who have watched the work of the Indian say he is in no condition and his race with Shrubbs at 15 miles can be nothing but a farce, especially as the Englishman is in the best of fettle.

Powers entered Longboat in his Marathon in New York next Saturday, but admitted that he did not expect the Indian to go.

There were all sorts of suggestions about a short track, when the runners were reading off the fast mile Saturday at the island, according to the score sheets. So right after the race some one put a tape again on the grass course with the result that it so proved, but only three feet to the lap, a little more than 120 yards in the 20 mile race, and the Indian is seconds. Still they are not satisfied and it was stated that a surveyor's certificate would be given out today.

John D. Marsh proved just as good a runner as his backers said he was. Last Saturday he will have a try at New York against the best of the amateurs, except Longboat and Shrubbs. Marsh is an Englishman about 32 years old. He ran as an amateur in the States, and since then has a victory to his credit over Shrubbs.

President Merrick and Secretary Crow of the C.A.A.U. were interested spectators of the Canadian Derby. Both were relieved to see several of the suspicious amateurs take the race, but when Red Hawk Jackson had never given trouble.

Meadows ran under an assumed name in Quebec. Sellen and Coley were always referred to as old country pros. Charlie Petch ran under a Federation card in the east and Cummings was a bone of contention with the A.A.U., but here he had no trouble. Before turning to the money ranks Simpson and Marsh had the reputations of sending in too heavy expense bills.

Kelley Uses Up Three Twirlers Providence Grays Enjoy Swatfest

Moffitt, Hickey and Connolly, a Recruit From New England, All Alike to the Enemy—Sunday Baseball.

PROVIDENCE, R.I., May 2.—(Special.)—Clouting the horsehide to all corners of the Rocky Point ball yard, driving two pitchers to the bay and badly mauling a third, with twenty clean hits, including a triple by Hoffman, and a double by Blackburn, the Providence Grays defeated Toronto this Sunday afternoon by a score of 13 to 3. Every man on the team took part in the batfest, and all pitchers looked alike. Hoffman, Rock and Arnold contributed four each, the longest hit of the game going to the credit of the famous, screaming triple to left, chasing Joe Kelley into the pool under the ropes. Blackburn's offering was a long drive to left centre for two bases in the sixth. With the bases full, the Grays crossed the plate in rapid-fire order. Moffitt was the first of the enemy's twirlers to feel the weight of the big stick. He lasted less than three innings, as a single in the first, two in the second, and three in the third satisfying Manager Kelley that it was not Moffitt's day. Hickey supplanted him with two down in the third session, and was found for a three-bagger by Hoffman the first crack out of the box. Three singles in the fourth and a like number in the fifth gave the signal for his retirement, and Connolly, a recruit from the Lynn team of the New England League, went in to finish out the season. He started in a mark for Duffy's men, and during his first innings in the box he fairly rained four runs across, but he stayed in. Ed. Barry kept up his reputation as a sure winner on the Rocky Point grounds. He had everything, including a barrel of speed, something unusual for one so early in the season. He started in by striking out the first two men up in the opening innings, and held the visitors safe all stages. His support was not gutted, but the half-dozen visits behind him caused no worry. The day was bitter cold, but not 100 saw the game.

Marsh, the Winner Wood is Second Meadows Third

All roads did not lead to the island Saturday for the big Canadian Marathon Derby, but all records were broken in the big event, when that western farmer, John D. Marsh, romped home a winner by one and three-quarter laps over Able Wood, the Montreal Harrier. The time was 2:39.47, and firmly establishes Marsh as a runner of some class, and one who will bear watching when the cracks hook up at New York next Saturday.

Sellen and Marsh set all the early pace, but after sixteen miles had been reached, the former dropped by the wayside, Marsh, who had the stamina as well as the early speed, taking the lead, which he maintained to the end. Wood tried often to start a sprint that would reduce Marsh's lead, but the latter stuck like glue, and the real race developed into a race for second place when their trainers should have used some horse sense and taken their charges off the field.

Out of the original twenty entrants, sixteen faced the starter, but half of these should have been eliminated from the race as they failed to get into the running, proving very bad also-rans, and while some of them kept running till the finish, they should have followed McNeil's footsteps and dropped by the wayside in the second mile. The also-rans were Jackson, Feich, Quinn, Cunningham, McNeil, Hutton, Bennett, Booth, Redding and Windmill. The third-place runner, Marsh kept the crowd on edge for the last sixteen miles by their numerous sprints, and when Sellen retired at the sixteenth mile, Marsh then had a clear lead of two laps over Wood, his nearest competitor, which he held safely to the remaining miles.

There is some doubt about the track being right, and while, for the time being, it must be accepted as right, yet Marsh's declaration would not do any harm.
