A BRUTAL MURDER IN MASSACHUSETTS. Woman's Body With Face Horribly Mutilated Found Near Her Home in Town of Leicester—No Clue as Yet.

Leicester, Mass., Nov. 28.—When the state and local police temporarily ceased their work at dark to-night they were no nearer a tangible clue as to the whereabouts or identity of the murderer of Mrs. Emma Richards Brigham than they were at the beginning of the day.

Because of the fact that the murderer is believed to be a tramp particular attention is being paid to that class of men not only by the police directly connected with the crime but by the authorities in nearly all the towns of the state. The police are anxious to question every man who is seen in the vicinity of the crime.

During the day nothing particularly new was unearthed by the police. It was decided, however, that robbery was not the motive and that criminal assault had not preceded the murder.

The detective Murphy who is in charge of the case, is authority for the statement that not a single clue of real importance has been discovered thus far. The work of the police, however, despite the discouraging result of their inquiries up to date will be continued tomorrow and they hope and believe that the murderer will be discovered in a day or two, giving as their reason for this expectation the belief that the murderer has been discovered without being discovered and that he will from day to day be compelled to beg for food. Following his movements in this manner the police hope to have the man in custody soon.

Leicester, Mass., Nov. 28.—The body of Mrs. Emma Brigham, bearing evidence which the police say indicates a most brutal murder, was found today partly covered with brush and leaves in a wood lot not far from the home in which Mrs. Brigham lived with her aged mother. The younger woman left her house yesterday afternoon to gather wood. When the body was found today the skull had been fractured, the nose broken and other features scarred and bruised.
