WONDERFUL WORK DONE BY WOMEN (Ottawa Citizen) In March the British ministry of munitions opened an exhibition in London

to stimulate interest and suggest what really can be done by women in the engineering industry. The war has given women the opportunity to reveal their capacity. F. G. Kellaway, M.P., parliamentary secretary to the ministry of munitions, on opening the exhibition, paid a fine tribute to the courage and calmness of the women workers in dangerous emergencies; mentioning as one instance the fact that after a serious explosion in a certain factory, when four of their fellow workers gave their lives in the munitions line of national service, the rest of the women all reported for duty as usual the next day. Women in the national munitions service are today building one of the best high-speed engines in the United Kingdom. Each woman is able to machine any piece of work that the machine tool she is operating will take. The women mechanics set their own work and tools, and are therefore fully qualified turners, and not merely operators of automatic turret lathes supervised by men. Women are building guns and gun mountings, including the fine fitting work on the breech mechanism, and the crew-cutting of large threads up to a shoulder. Mechanical engineers will appreciate such instances of the progress of women in the workshops; for there is a profound difference between plain shell turning and the turning operations on a breech block. The women are doing much of the work on the 3 1/2 ton army lorries, and expect to be doing practically the whole of it, including chassis erecting and testing, if the war lasts much longer. They are doing important work in marine engine building, including turning the connecting rods, propeller shafting, liners and practically all the marked-off drilling. The aero-engine at the beginning of the war was considered a toolroom job throughout. Only the most skilled mechanical engineers are regarded as capable of working to the accuracy demanded in the toolroom. In some shops women are engaged on the aero-engine, and working with half of a thousandth of an inch precision on centre lathes.
