Hon. Dr. Foster Says Structure Will Cost About \$150,000

## VOTE TO COMPLETE DREDGING EXPECTED

Delegation Returns From Ottawa After Parley With Federal Cabinet

THE estimated expenditure on the new train shed to be erected in Saint John this year will be \$150,000, Hon. W. E. Foster announced yesterday. Dr. Foster returned yesterday from Ottawa where he conferred with representatives of the Federal government on matters of provincial interest. With Dr. Foster were R. T. Hayes, Hon. E. A. Smith, of Shediac and Hon. A. B. Copp, of Sackville.

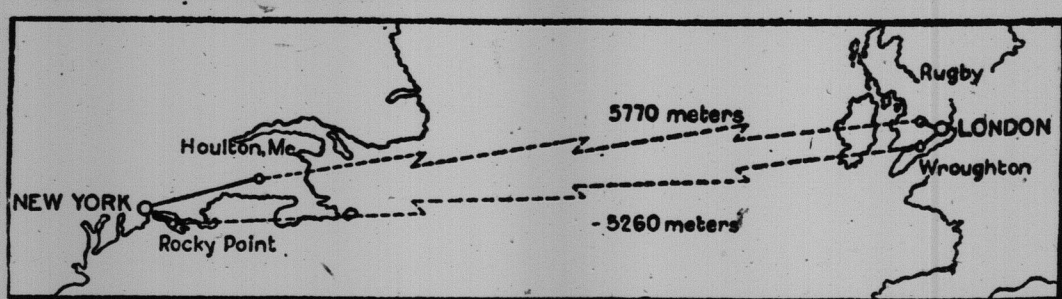
Dr. Foster said that reports that the purpose of the visit was to press for New Brunswick representation in the government were without foundation. There was no intention in the Liberal party to interfere with the present representation from Gloucester county and it was felt that the election of that county were well satisfied with their member and did not wish for any change.

**CONFIRMS ANNOUNCEMENT.**

The object of the visit to Ottawa was to talk over matters of provincial interest generally, but more particularly with reference to Saint John-Albert needs. As a result of the conference Dr. Foster said that he was in a position to confirm his previous announcement that a new train shed would be erected here this year. The estimated cost was \$150,000.
