India's relations with her neighbors as a factory, no outstanding questions being under consideration. The Viceroy dwelt at length the need of a great development through a central co-ordination organization.

EXPECTS BOOM WITH THIS YEAR'S CROP

Geo. Doig, Former Saint John Man, in City From Brandon.

That the people of the Prairie Provinces expect this year's crop to give them a fresh start on the road to prosperity was a statement made by George Doig of Brandon, who came here from Montreal to see his father, D. B. Doig, and other relatives for a few days. Mr. Doig is a merchant in Brandon and a member of the Board of Trade of that city. He says the success of the wheat pool last year was shown by the fact that it brought the farmer members \$150 a bushel for their wheat, and they anticipated better of a profitable crop had a great effect in establishing confidence and stimulating enterprise throughout the Prairie Provinces.

When a representative of this paper was in Brandon last winter the Board of Trade was discussing a proposal to link up the city with outlying communities by a motor bus service that would bring more trade to the city. Mr. Doig said that two of these motor bus services, each making a circuit of about 100 miles, had since been established.

Brandon is the centre of a great agricultural district, and the agricultural citizens are reaching out for enlarged business. Its merchants he thought would improve their position very materially as a result of this year's crop.

RIVER SEARCH IS UNAVAILING

No Trace of Baby in Alleged Tragedy at Reversing Falls

Detectives Secure Witnesses for Next Week, While Search Keeps Up

No trace of the body of the five weeks old baby whom Marguerite Colpitts is alleged to have thrown into the waters of the Reversing Falls early on Tuesday morning has been discovered after two days of continuous searching. The search being continued this afternoon it was said today. The police, it is alleged, have secured a statement from the girl regarding her movements but this matter cannot be verified as the local detectives refused to speak of this feature.

LOOKING EVERYWHERE.

Sergeant Detective Power said this afternoon that the harbor department's motor boat had been placed at the disposal of the police and the search for the body was being pursued vigorously. Sergeant O'Neill for the last two days has been in charge and he has searched along Navy Island, the sides of the wharves along the river below the falls, the west side docks and Courtenay Bay. The various wharves along the shore and at Macleod's Beach have also been visited.

At the time the child was alleged to have been thrown into the water the current was running out. The police have been assisted by advice from men familiar with the tides and currents in the harbor and it was following their advice that Sergeant O'Neill and Detective Biddlecombe resumed the search this afternoon.

The preliminary hearing of the murder charge against Marguerite Colpitts will be commenced probably on Monday. Meanwhile the detectives are securing witnesses.

SHOWS CANADA CHANCE TO TRADE

Visiting South African Merchant Suggests Good Refrigerator Service

Declares Cheaper Fruit Among Benefits and There Would Be No Competition.

MONTREAL, Aug. 21.—Canadians can encourage trade within the Empire and at the same time help themselves to the blessing of cheaper fruits by looking to South Africa, is the opinion of A. C. Kiddle, of Kimberley, South Africa, who came to Canada with the Field Marshal Haig party, and stayed over to look after business matters. Mr. Kiddle's company has for many years been importers of Canadian flour, and while here he has been studying the flour market.

CHEAPER FRUITS

Speaking of trade relations between the two dominions, Mr. Kiddle said he had been much struck to note high prices charged for fruit, instancing grapefruit for example. He figures that the establishment of an adequate refrigerator service from Cape Town to Canadian ports, would enable the Canadian consumer to enjoy the benefit of cheaper fruits.

The importation of fruit from South Africa would not in any way constitute competition with the Canadian fruit growers, he said, the reason being that the seasons are reversed, the height of summer coming in South Africa in the middle of December, while the fruits of winter are in the middle of June in South Africa.

FOUR CENTS GRAPEFRUIT

Mr. Kiddle said, for example, that he believed grapefruit could be loaded on the boats at Cape Town at two pence each, and while he was not prepared to estimate the cost of carriage from Cape Town to Montreal did not believe it would be prohibitive. He based this belief on the fact that it costs him more to ship his flour by rail from Cape Town to Kimberley, a distance of some 600 miles, than from Montreal to Cape Town. South of Cape Town, Mr. Kiddle said, he produced for her fruits, of which she produced a great variety, and he believed that a trade of that kind could be developed with Canada. At present there was a preferential arrangement between the two countries on some lines, running from two to three per cent. Canada

Mr. Kiddle, asked as to the preference to British goods given by South Africa, said that the elimination of the general preferential tariff to Britain, and the substitution thereof of preferences on various articles, had not changed matters very much. On some lines the British preference ran to 5 per cent, on other lines it was lower, the maximum being 5 per cent.
