burial service and interment will take place.

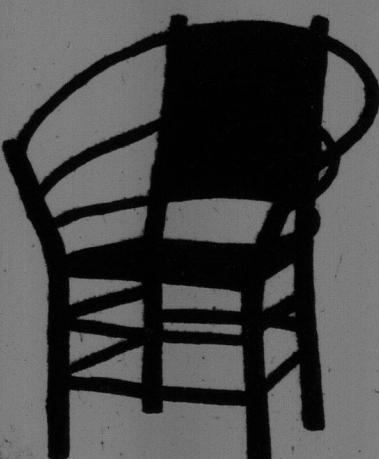
S. W. Hatheway.

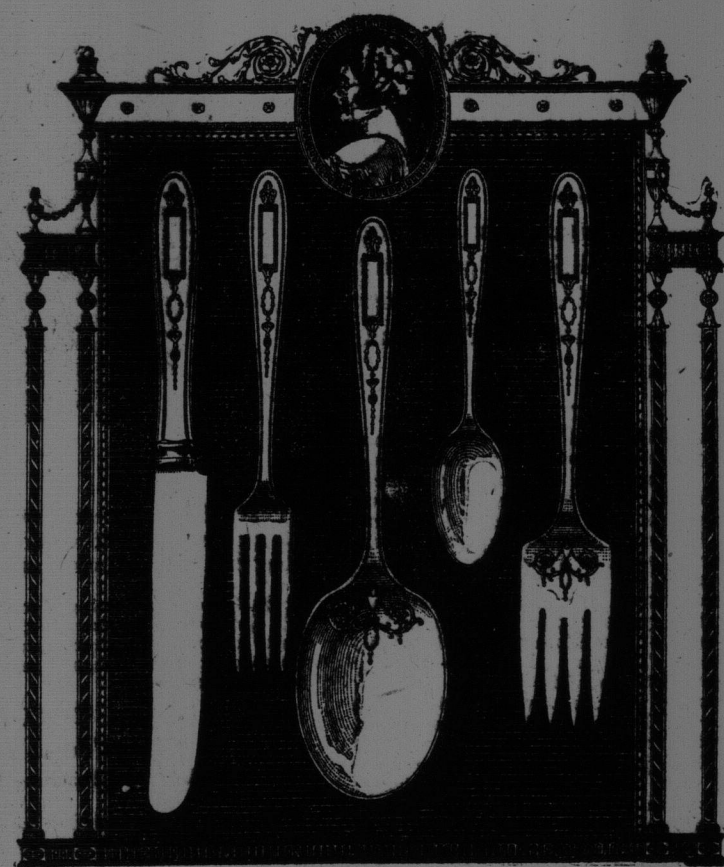

## WRITES NEW VERSE FOR GRAY'S ELEGY

Justice Darling Severely Scores Some Modern Tendencies in Literature.

London, May 27.—(By mail).—A dinner was given by A. Charles Knight, chairman of the Library Committee of the City Corporation, last evening at the Tallow Chandlers' Hall. This year marks the quinquenary of the founding of the Guildhall Library by Richard Whittington in 1433.

Mr. Justice Darling, proposing "Literature and Art," said that there were many more of those who observed something of art than those who called literature which did not cost more than a penny. With regard to reading in the papers that the pictures were the worst that ever were painted, that if there ever was an Academy worse than this one it was the last, that it was certain none would surpass the present in atrocity, and that the people who ought to be hung (that was the word used) had not been hung. With the latter observation, professionally, he concurred.

The poet Gray in his "Elegy" pictured for himself what the "rude forefathers of the hamlet" might have done if they had had the advantage of knowing how to read. He (the speaker) would repeat a verse that did not appear in everybody's edition of Gray and which, with modern know-

ledge, the poet might have written—"Lewd license to their eyes his bawdy page, Stain'd with forensic filth, had ne'er unroll'd; Sex problems did not maiden's thoughts engage, And children kept their innocence of soul."

He was inclined to reflect, on thinking of the necessary bill introduced into the House of Commons the previous day, that one might be thankful the "rude forefathers of the hamlet" had the advantage over their descendants that that verse was true about them. The toast was replied to by Sir Anthony Hope Hawkins and Sir Aston Webb. Sir Aston Webb remarked that there were those who favored the increasing of the height of buildings in the city to 160 feet. He could say, as president of the Royal Academy, that they would spoil the city and be a crime and a sin.

## SLAIN MAN'S ESTATE TO CAUSE A CONTEST

Nephew, Convicted of Murder, the Principal Heir Under Will—Other Kin to Seek Distribution.

New York, June 20.—An estate, principally in real property, which is now valued at more than \$800,000, and which, according to experts, is likely to increase to \$1,500,000 or \$2,000,000 within a short time, located in the heart of the business and tenement house section of Morris Park in Queens, is about to become a matter of contest in the courts in Queens. The estate is that of Gaetano Mastrota, a shoemaker of the Park, who was killed in his shop on the night of January 28 last, following a quarrel with his nephew, Albert Mastrota. Late Friday night a jury in the Queens County Court found Albert guilty of murder in the first degree. He is to be sentenced by County Judge Burt J. Humphrey tomorrow.

A list of the property owned by Gaetano Mastrota and his will were found after his death. This will left practically all of this fortune to the nephew convicted of killing him. Albert was also named as the executor. When the will was filed Albert, then under arrest for his uncle's murder, resigned as the executor, and Surrogate Noble appointed Albert's only brother, Vincent Mastrota, as administrator. Sidney Rosenthal, attorney for Albert, will appeal from the murder verdict. He said yesterday that he also would take court action to keep the estate together pending a final decision on the appeal. In the meantime others who might share in the distribution of the estate are consulting attorneys in an effort to get some kind of distribution.

## FRENCH INSTITUTE OF ART ESTABLISHED AT DAMASCUS

Paris, (By Mail).—A few months ago a French institute was established at Damascus, Syria. It consists of a museum and a school of decorative arts. The museum contains some fine pieces of Arabic art. M. de Lorey, a distinguished Orientalist, has been chosen as director of the institute. The school will have its "boursiers," or scholarship students, who will take charge of listing and classifying the art relics.

## TO SAFEGUARD FOREIGN TRAVELERS IN CHINA

London, June 20.—Great Britain, in collaboration with the U. S. and other powers, is considering what measures can be taken in co-operation with the Chinese Government for the safeguarding of foreign passengers while traveling on the Chinese railroads. One suggestion considered is the formation of a Chinese gendarmerie under the command of Allied and U. S. officers.

## STAND-STILL AT LAUSANNE.

Lausanne, June 20.—The Near East conference continues suspended. Great Britain, France and Italy are still striving to decide on a common course to pursue with the Turks relative to the Ottoman debt. France is said to be standing out for complete protection of the bondholders.

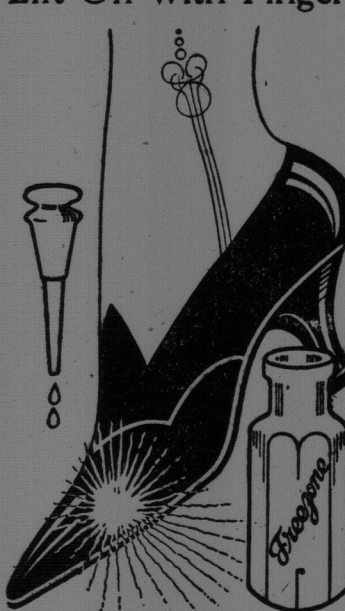
## COMMONS VOTES DOWN PROPOSAL TO REDUCE THE DUTY ON SUGAR
