AMATEUR HOCKEY FAVORED OVER INDEPENDENT
(Amherst News.)
Independent hockey was not given any great encouragement by the Amherst representatives, who met Frank Brown and Buzz MacLeod of Moncton, at the Terrace Hotel last evening. With the exception of eight Amherst hockey players in the hands of Mr. Pat Neville, Chairman of the Reinstatement Committee of the M. B. A. U. C.—and as New Glasgow has six such affidavits before the same authority, as well as certain other applications from Halifax, the chance for Independent hockey is apparently slim. Of course the situation of the Reinstatement Committee is a matter of the attitude of the M. B. A. U. C. will take towards these applications. If the affidavits received favorably the younger Independent hockey players should have notice of their reinstatement within the next two weeks, so Mr. Neville informed the meeting last night by telephone. Until that time nothing can be done in either an Independent or an Amateur direction.

The names of Chester Gregory, Jack Twaddle, Lester Lowther, George Stuart and John Chisholm have not been sent in for reinstatement. Mr. Gregory, this winter is standing behind amateur hockey, and expects to make his money from the game as manager of the rink in New Glasgow. George Stuart is willing to give the younger players similar assistance. Lester Lowther in particular made a determined stand against

phone, but he told a representative that he would be in Moncton at an early date, and take up the question with certain of the players. Mr. Brown afterward remarked that the Moncton players would not take the affidavits—not as the said affidavits stood at the present time. In addressing the meeting, Mr. Brown, who is regarded as one of the whitest sportsmen in the Maritime Provinces, explained Moncton's views. He said that Moncton had gone into Independent Hockey last winter with Amherst and New Glasgow. His men were amateurs during 1919-1922, but had turned through the impression that the New Glasgow—Amherst—Moncton combine would be permanent, and for the reason that Amherst would have been unable to put a strong team on the ice with-out the services of Lester Lowther, George Stuart and John Twaddle. Something can be said in favor of Mr. Brown's views, but the old Amherst professionals regarded the matter in a different light—as they claimed that they were responsible for eight younger men losing their chance to keep in amateur hockey, and that now, if possible, they wanted these men back in the minor pure ranks—where they had a perfect right to be.

It was decided that a further affidavits for reinstatement had passed through the proper hands.

BABE RUTH WARMLY GREETED IN DEBUT ON NEW YORK STAGE

Babe Ruth made his New York debut as a vaudeville act the other afternoon, and he packed them in at the Palace as he did at the Polo Ground during the baseball season. The S. B. O. sign was at work early. Ruth's work lacks the polish of the other acts, as might be expected, but it is far better than that done in other years by baseball stars on the variety stage. Ruth has good stage presence and a winning smile. The home-run king was made to feel perfectly at home before he had spoken a word. His first appearance on the stage evoked applause that went on continuously for more than a minute while Ruth bowed back his thanks time and again.

Canadian Bred Horse Wins
New York, Nov. 17.—(Canadian Press)—Animation, owned by Louie Combs, Kansas City, last night won the two thousand dollars stake for harness horses, and the title of world's champion, at the National Horse Show in the armory of Squadron A.

The prize was the largest in the history of the annual event. Animation is a Canadian bred chestnut, champion of the last National Horse Show. Won H. Wannamaker, J.P.'s American bred hackney mare Eve was second and James Putnam's English champion, Field Marshal III, was third.

CHIEF RESIGNED; IS NOW PATROLMAN

His Application for Position Approved by Police Committee.

Sandwich, Ont., Nov. 17.—Gordon Pilon, who resigned his position as Chief of Police, following charges preferred against him by the Police Committee of the Town Council that he had failed to keep his records accurately, and had not prosecuted a certain resident of the town for intoxication, made application to the town council for a position as a patrolman, and his application was approved.

The ex-chief's formal letter of resignation came before the Council, and upon recommendation of the police committee it was promptly accepted. Pilon, there-fore, becomes an ordinary policeman on the force of which up to 10 days ago he was in command.
