LOCAL NEWS

Rev. Percy Ouleg, Primitive Baptist, formerly of Southampton, now of Perth, was run over by an automobile last week and his right leg broken. He also was injured internally.

Ira McAfee of Woodstock, yesterday received word that his brother, Jack, met with a serious accident in Boston on Saturday. He was working on a building and fell 114 feet.

Captain Frank Finley, of Westfield, was brought to the city on Saturday evening and admitted to the General Public Hospital suffering wounds about the head and face, the result of a premature explosion when he was conducting some blasting operations at Nepesip.

WAR TRADE MATTERS

To facilitate business the secretary of the St. John board of trade has received copies of the new form X, which must be used by persons applying to the U. S. War Board for export licenses. Instructions regarding procedure have also been secured.

The U. S. War Trade Board is now permitting the importation of cured and preserved mackerel and herring from the United Kingdom, on the ground that there is not sufficient European mackerel to consume all the catch of mackerel and herring in the vicinity of the British Isles, and as certain communities, particularly in Ireland, are employed in curing these products in a way adapted to the American market and are dependent on their sale, the War Trade Board has decided upon this relaxation of its regulations.

In a circular of Aug. 14, issued by the U. S. War Trade Board, it says: "In view of the adoption by the Canadian government of the same policy of import control as that endorsed by the War Trade Board through their import restrictions, the War Trade Board has determined to continue to permit the importation from Canada and Newfoundland under a general license, P. B. F. 3, of all articles except those mentioned in the president's import proclamation of Nov. 28, 1917, and except calcium carbide, olive oil, tannin, soap, and herring in the vicinity of the British Isles, and as certain communities, particularly in Ireland, are employed in curing these products in a way adapted to the American market and are dependent on their sale, the War Trade Board has decided upon this relaxation of its regulations.

LITTLE TOT ATTACKED; INDIAN ARRESTED

Four-Year Old Child of William J. Jones of Germain Street—Michael Bear Shot by Pursuer

At Gerow's Wharf on Saturday, it is charged, Michael Bear, an Indian, attacked little Dorothy Cox, the five-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Jones, of 188 Germain street, who was visiting at Gerow's Wharf with her mother, and grievously injured the child. Last night it was feared she would die. The little girl was playing a few yards from the home of her uncle, Robert Jones, when, it is said, the Indian came upon her and dragged her into the bushes. She was missed and a search was begun. The Indian tried to make his escape, but was brought to a standstill only when given a few rounds of buck shot from a shot gun by Harry Black. He was arrested and is at present in the county jail at Gagetown. Bear had been discharged from Cavitch & Pagnon's construction camp on the Valley Railway on Saturday and took the steamer Majestic to Wickham. Arriving there he walked down to Gerow's Wharf. The little one's father is a driver for Macaulay Bros. & Co.

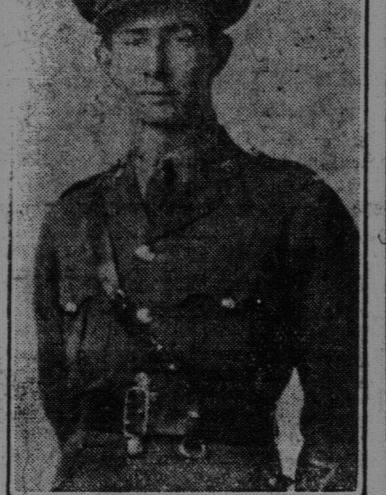

For Siberia. Military officials yesterday contradicted a rumor that No. 9 Siege Battery, now under canvas at Red Head, was to be disorganized and added to the strength of the Canadian expeditionary force to Siberia. Men of the battery said that Major Wetmore informed them that he had volunteered for service in Siberia and asked how many of the men would volunteer to go. It is said that every man did so.

A squadron of cavalry, to be furnished by the Northwest Mounted Police, will form part of the Canadian expeditionary force to Siberia. Captain Carson, M. C. Killed. Montreal, Aug. 17.—Private cable advice received by Major-General Sir John W. Carson (C. B.), advises him that his son, Captain J. C. K. Carson, M. C., was killed in action on the 11th inst. No other details are yet available. Captain Carson, who was the only son of General Carson, left Montreal with the 1st contingent, and served continuously until the time of his death.

Captain Carson received his education at Westmont Academy, and Lower Canada College, and previous to the war was employed in the Union Bank, Montreal office. Immediately on the outbreak of war he volunteered for overseas service, and was given a commission

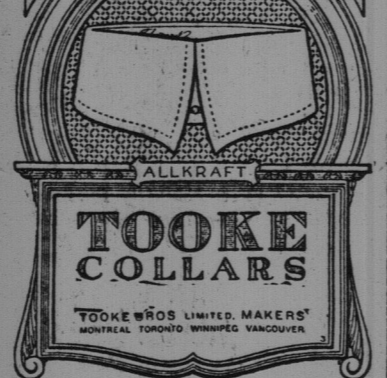

MURDER AND SUICIDE IN MONTREAL TRAGEDY

Montreal, Aug. 18.—A. J. Mullen, 35 years of age, ascertained by papers found on his body, to be cashier of one of the National Banks in New York, shot a girl named Vina Roy, 20 years, in the left breast and subsequently shot and killed himself tonight in a rooming house at 150 Metcalfe street in this city. The man had recently arrived here from New York and claimed to be the girl's uncle. He had visited her several times. People in the house say that they had heard the man threaten the girl and he had told her that he would kill her if she went out with a certain man. Tonight, it is stated she went out with the man and returned to the house where her alleged uncle met her.

There was the sound of a shot, followed by a violent altercation in her room and then the sound of shots in rapid succession. The people in the house broke into the room where the found her lying in a pool of blood. Mullen was lying across the bed unconscious. He had fired three shots at himself, two of which took effect in his head and the third in the breast. It was at once seen there was no hope of his recovery and attention was turned to the girl. She had been shot in the left breast and was covered with blood. The ambulance was called and the police notified.

MORNING WAR NOTES.

Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig was decorated with a French Military Cross by Premier Clemenceau at headquarters on the battlefield yesterday.

An old French cruiser, the Dupetit Thouars, has been sunk by a German submarine. Thirteen of the crew are missing.

The British tank steamer Mirlo was torpedoed by a German submarine off Cape Hatteras yesterday. Nine members of the crew are reported drowned.

Heavy firing was heard all Saturday forenoon off a Canadian port on the Atlantic coast. About 1 o'clock a thick black smoke was seen coming from sea.
