GOVERNMENT MEETING

The number of inspectors, of whom there are now four, will be increased and a canvass of the province will be made to locate definitely areas affected by the powdery scab and also sections clear. From the latter districts potatoes will be reserved for seed.

The government heard a delegation from the St. John Exhibition Association asking for a grant for 1914. Consideration was promised.

The members then adjourned to the Union Club where they were the guests of Lieutenant-Governor Wood at luncheon.

This afternoon they meet as the board of education and afterwards will visit the provincial hospital. They hope to complete their business this evening.

(Continued from page 1) In other years it has been the custom to decide the order in which the lots will be offered by drawing lots before the meeting. There have been complaints that this was not done fairly, and in order to satisfy everybody, the order of sale was decided this morning by the mayor drawing lots in the open meeting.

The bidding was limited and many lots sold at five and ten cents each. The only large amounts realized were \$100, the upset price for one lot; \$801, one dollar in advance of the upset price of another; \$161, which was reached with small bids and which compares favorably with the price of \$76 paid for the same lots last year and \$4135 for a block of five lots, after some spirited bidding in a small way. Apart from these, the highest sum realized was \$1.

No Bids for Navy Island. When the Navy Island lots were offered there was no bidding at all, not even the upset price being offered. Two lots in Courtenay Bay were sold for the first time in many years.

SENTENCES CONFIRMED

Conviction of Twenty-four Labor Leaders Stands; Six to Be Retried

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 6.—The judgment of the district court in Indianapolis sentencing to prison 30 members of the International Association of Structural Iron Workers, was affirmed today, by the United States circuit court of appeals in twenty-four cases. Six cases were sent back for trial, those of Oief A. T. Hime, San Francisco; Wm. McCain, Kansas City, Mo.; James E. Ray, Peoria, Ill.; Richard H. Houlhan, Chicago, Ill.; Fred Sherman, Indianapolis; Wm. Bernhardt, Cincinnati, O. The sentence of seven years penal servitude against Frank M. Ryan of Chicago, president of the association, was affirmed. The cases arose out of the Los Angeles dynamiting.

CONDENSED DESPATCHES

Sir Lionel Corden, British minister to Mexico, is to be transferred. This, it is said, shows England's purpose to remove all obstructions from the path of President Wilson in dealing with Mexico. Corden was believed to sympathize with the Huerta government. Charles Murray Maclean probably will succeed him.

The damage done by the "Arson squad" of the suffragettes in 1913 is placed at \$3,500,000. The insurance companies are showing concern. The Greek chamber of deputies today approved a bill for the issue of a loan of \$100,000,000 repayable in fifty years, at five per cent interest. The minimum price is to be 87 3/4.

Orville Wright, premier aviator, is perfecting an aerobal and also says he has a stability device that will make aviation safe.

BILL A SURPRISE. A bill from the D. A. R. for \$550 was presented to Mayor Frink this morning for the value of an old shed on the Peltingill wharf, which was removed to make room for the Red Cross warehouse, and also included the sum of \$10 for one year's rent. The shed has been in the possession of the city for many years, and for a long time has been rented by the city to a rigger. This was the first intimation the present city government had that they did not own the shed. The matter will be investigated.

A new note of luxury was found on trans-Atlantic liners on which Christmas cards and gifts were to be bought in attractively decorated shops. Cards could also be printed to order in the office of the liner's daily paper.

Out of a single rock maple tree cut from his own woodlot, O. C. Record of West Kingsfield, Me., cut and piled two cords and four feet of firewood.

Not His Fault. Declaring in a loud voice that he was king of both Illinois and Indiana, an unidentified man yesterday straddled the monument in South Chicago, which marks the division between the two states. Patrolman Peter Johnson wanted to arrest the man, but doubted his authority.

"Half of him is in Indiana and I can't take him out of another state," a police officer told headquarters over the telephone.

"Arrest the half that's in Illinois," was the instruction of headquarters, "and if the rest of him wants to come it ain't your fault." — Chicago cron. Cleveland Plain Dealer.

REFUSED. The request of the C. P. R. for permission to erect a platform along the sidewalk in Union street, West, in order to handle trucks, was refused by the common council yesterday.
