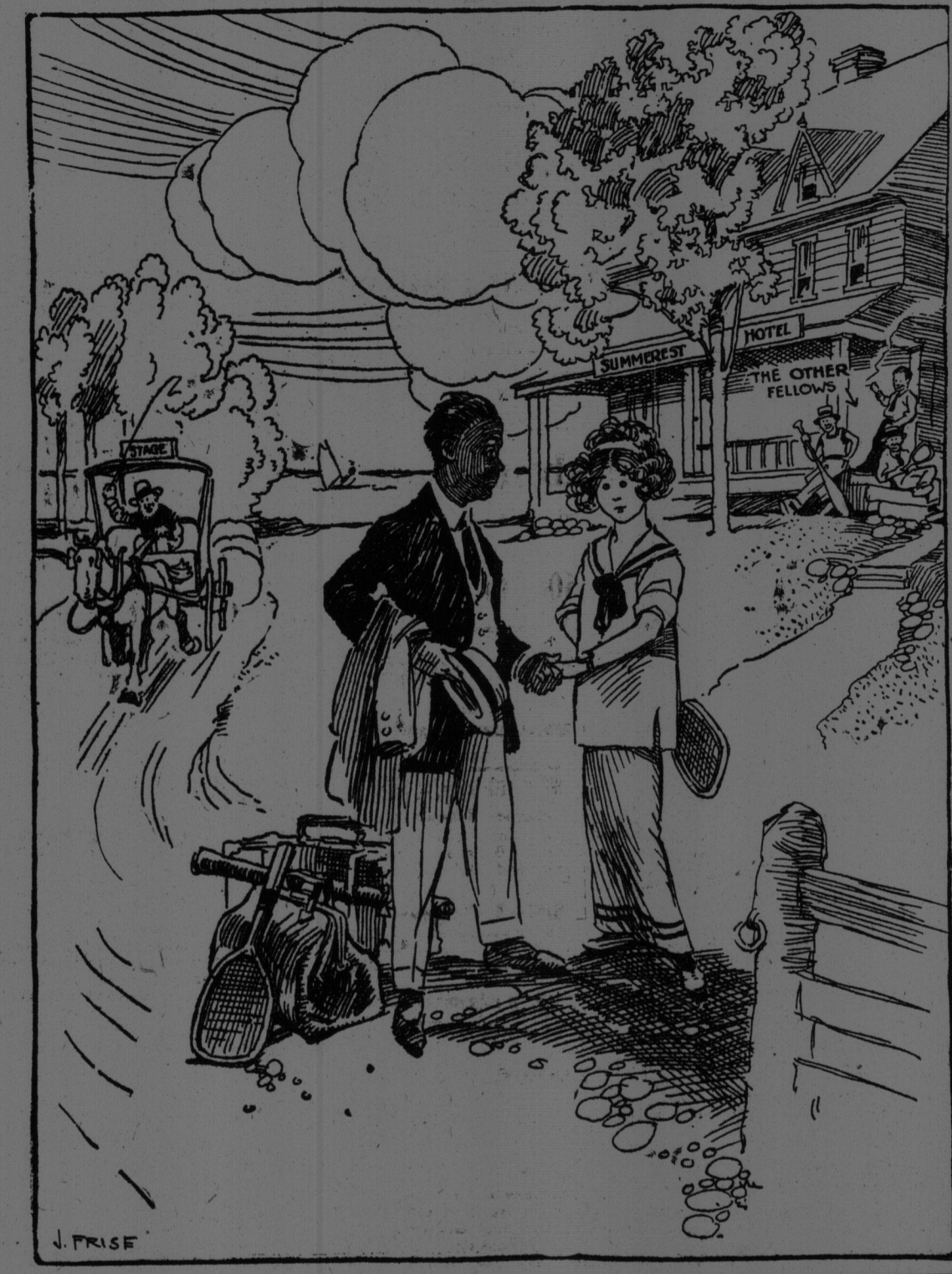

CANADIAN IMMIGRATION

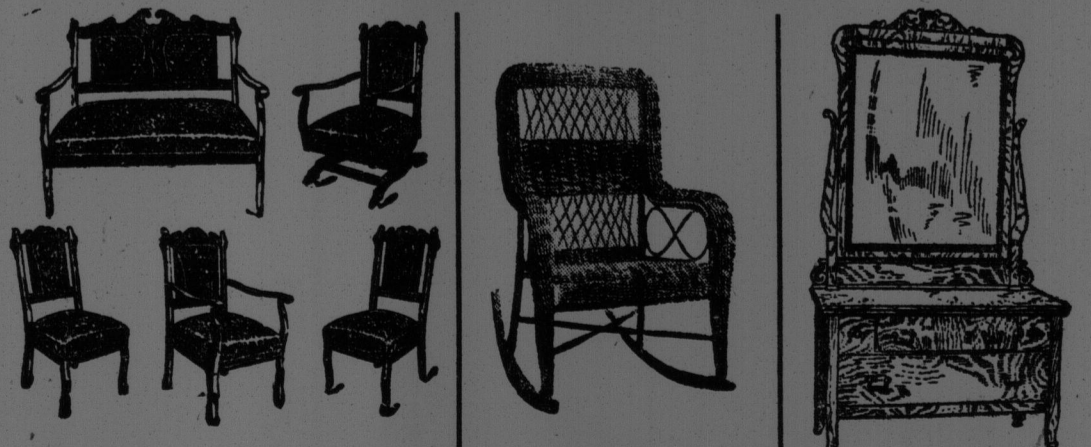
Ottawa, August 7 - A statistical report issued by the immigration department, gives some interesting figures as to the nationality and distribution of the 2,821,144 immigrants who have come to Canada during the thirteen fiscal years ended March 31 last. It is worthy of note that eastern Canada got nearly half or 1,410,688 of these new citizens, as compared with 1,410,688 who went to the prairie provinces and to British Columbia. Ontario took the lion's share, the total reported as settling in that province being 626,294. The three maritime provinces got 109,250; Quebec, 874,257; Manitoba, 286,918; British Columbia, 298,874, and Alberta and Saskatchewan between them 202,186. During the last fiscal year, out of a total of 402,482 immigrants, Ontario got 122,798, the maritime provinces, 19,969; Quebec, 64,880; Manitoba, 48,818; Saskatchewan, 46,147; Alberta, 48,078, and British Columbia, 57,260. It will be noted that last year over half the total number of immigrants arriving were destined to the eastern provinces.

A REMARKABLE FAMILY

Washington, Aug. 8 - What is regarded by the pension bureau as the history ever of one of the most remarkable families ever coming beneath its notice is contained in a letter received from Dr. William Warren, of St. Joseph, Mo. The letter is in reply to one from the pension commission asking Dr. Warren for his family history so that a readjustment in his pension might be made under the new law. Dr. Warren replied: "I do not know whether there was a family record of the births of all my father's children, of whom there were 23 in all by three wives, who were sisters, and of whom the first two wives were twins and the third wife also was one of twins. My mother had triplets, three boys, of whom I was one. She had no other children. All the other wives' children were twins. In all of the three wives, there were thirteen boys, all of whom were soldiers. All of the twenty-five children are dead but myself. The veteran is seventy-six years old. He will get an increase in pension."

BODY OF REVERE WOMAN FOUND IN MANHOLE; MAY BE MURDER CASE

Revere, Aug. 7 - The body of a woman was afterwards identified as Mrs. Josephine Boyle, aged 32, of Chelsea, was found in a new manhole at the edge of the Lynn marsh. A wound over the left eye and the finding of two cents and a handkerchief with blood upon it at some distance from the manhole led the police to suspect that the woman might have met with foul play. She was identified this noon by Charles Barclay, her brother, with whom she lived, together with her daughter. Mrs. Boyle was born in Chelsea and had always lived there. Her health had not been good for some time. In the evening she ate supper at 7 o'clock. Her daughter went out for a short time and on returning home about 9:30 found her mother missing. A search was made, and later, when Mr. Barclay returned home, after 11, he also began a search that lasted until 8 o'clock in the morning, but without success.

MRS. BRYAN GOES HOME TO CAN FRUIT

Freugal Housewife Cannot Forget Berries, Plums, and Peaches on Nebraska Farm. Washington, Aug. 8 - As the wife of the secretary of state, Mrs. William Jennings Bryan, is a leader in the cabinet set, yet this social obligation has not changed her from a true housewife. So, while other prominent women are at the seashore, Mrs. Bryan has gone to Lincoln, Nebraska, to the Bryan home to superintend the canning of fruit for use this winter.

65,000,000 POUNDS OF BUTTER IN STORAGE

Enables Prices to Be Held at Mid-Point. Chicago, Aug. 6 - Although Chicago housewives have been paying midwinter prices for butter and a further advance is expected there are more than 65,000,000 pounds of the product in cold storage according to the report of the warehousemen's association, on Wednesday. This is better than 10,000,000 pounds more than the reserve a year ago. A half cent increase on Tuesday made the price 28 1/2 cents to jobbers and another advance of one cent was predicted for Wednesday. Prices to consumers range from 35 to 38 cents according to location. Jobbers attribute the high prices and enormous cold storage stocks to the warfare between the Chicago and Elgin butter boards. Jobbers have been in the habit of contracting in advance for butter to be delivered during the season of greatest production on a basis of Elgin prices. This year Elgin quotations have been relatively higher than prices at any of the leading markets of the nation. Jobbers have been paying more for butter than they could sell at and have been forced to place their purchases in cold storage awaiting a higher market. There has been an unusually early production of butter and so much of it has gone in storage that jobbers anticipate a drop if there is a mild winter.

Daily Hints For the Cook

SOUP FOR INVALIDS Cut into small pieces 1 pound of beef or mutton or a part of both. Boil it gently in 2 quarts of water. Take off the scum, and when reduced to a pint strain it and season with a little salt. Give 1 teacupful at a time.

CHANNING CAKE

Into a graduated cup put the unbeaten white of two eggs. Fill up to the half measure with softening, not melted, butter. Four onto this 1/2 cup sweet milk, in which 1/2 teaspoon of soda is dissolved. Into the flour sifter put one cup sugar, 1 1/2 cups pastry flour, 1 teaspoon cream tartar. Sift these ingredients three times, then add to the egg whites milk and soda and flavor with vanilla. Beat vigorously five minutes with wire egg whip. Bake in an oven warmer than for ordinary cake at first then reduce the heat and you will have a very fine-grained cake that keeps most better than usual.
