Some Nova Scotia Fruit Reached
England in Poor Condition
(Halifax Chronicle).

Apple shipments for November
through the port of Halifax showed a
decrease of 22,417 barrels from the cor-
responding month of 1912. Following are
the figures for the two seasons: 1912,
November 1912, 113,756 bar-
rels; November 1913, 90,339 barrels.

Shipments of the fruit for the cor-
responding seasons of the two years were
for 1913, to the end of November, 84-
490 barrels less. The following are the
figures for the two seasons: 1912,
December 1, 378,782 barrels; 1913,
December 1, 284,416 barrels. The falling
off has not been in proportion to what
it will be for the whole year which will
end next March, accounted for in this

NEW HEBRIDES ISLE
OVERWHELMED BY
MOLTEN LAVA

Steamer Rescued 500 of The
Inhabitants Who Sought Refuge
in Boats

Melbourne, Australia, Dec. 15.—Des-
patches from Noumea, capital of the
French colony of New Caledonia, report
that great destruction has been wrought
by a volcanic eruption in Ambrim Is-
land, of the New Hebrides group. Six
new craters were formed on the west
coast. Dec. 6. The following day
Mount Muntia collapsed and many vil-
lages were overwhelmed by streams of
molten lava. The majority of the in-
habitants sought refuge in canoes and
boats and a steamer rescued 500 of
them.

No casualties are reported among the
white population, whose numbers are
small, but it is feared that many natives
in the interior perished.

Ambim Island is about fifty miles in
circumference and is somewhat sparsely
inhabited.
