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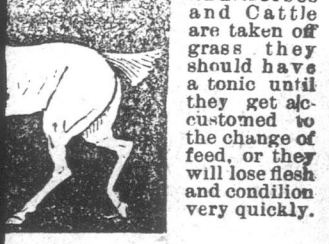

PROGRESS OF NEGOTIATIONS

The Capture of Wei Hai Wei Would Upset All the Arrangements.

Statement of the Value of Spoils Taken by the Japanese Army.

Tokyo, Jan. 8.—Per Steamer Peru to San Francisco, Jan. 22.—The only late change in the diplomatic situation since the last advices is the announcement that Chang Yen Hwan, China's accredited agent, is actually on his way to Japan, accompanied by a subordinate representative named Sha Yu Lien.

The capture of Wei-Hai-Wei, now regarded as a foregone conclusion, may, however, again alter the aspect of affairs.

The fact that Mr. Foster will accompany the Chinese envoys in the capacity of legal adviser does not change the opinion of the Japanese with respect to the sincerity of China's intention.

A final announcement of the valuable spoils thus far taken from the Chinese has been published by the Japanese government.

From a recent report of the Japanese surgeon-general, Ishiguro, the amount and quality of food and clothing supplied to the army is ascertained.

The supply of food for the soldiers is very simple, rice being the basis.

The director of hospitals in the field states that the wounded almost invariably protest against the use of the bandages made by the empress and dowager empress at Tokyo.

STRIKE DRAWING TO A CLOSE

Street Car Companies Are Getting the Best of the Strikers in Brooklyn.

Linemen Go Out, But Men Are Found in Numbers to Take Their Places.

Brooklyn, N. Y., Jan. 24.—The beginning of the end of the great trolley strike was reached today.

A number of trolley wires were cut during the night, but the cars on most of the lines were running yesterday.

Thomas Carney, who while working on the roof of 444 Hicks street yesterday was shot by soldiers of the Thirtieth regiment, died at Long Island college hospital at 2:35 o'clock this morning.

A serious disturbance occurred at Enoch last month, when an attempt was made to bury the remains of Captain Fong, beheaded for cowardice at the naval battle of the campaign, with the ceremonies appropriate to the rank that he held.

Foreign newspapers of Shanghai contain a translation of an alleged imperial rescript, so extravagant in character that its authenticity is scarcely credited.

William McGrath, aged 26, a conductor, residing at 540 Broadway; Richard Lyman, aged 38, a motorman, residing at 7 Hindal street, were arrested for pulling down trolley wires at Broadway and Stewart street early this morning.

Tyrrell, head of the geological survey department at Ottawa, who has just returned from an exploration of the northern barren lands of Canada, has been asked by Professor Steines, head of the United States geological survey to lead a party to Ellesmere land, situated in the northwest corner of Greenland, across Smith sound from Ingfield landing.

DEATH CAME PEACEFULLY.

After Long and Dradful Suffering Lord Randolph Churchill Dies.

Sketch of the Life of One of Britain's Most Remarkable Statesmen.

London, Jan. 24.—Lord Randolph Churchill died at 6:15 o'clock this morning. Death was peaceful and painless.

The Right Hon. Lord Randolph Henry Spencer Churchill, M. P., second son of the sixth Duke of Marlborough by marriage with Lady Frances Anne Emily, eldest daughter of the third Marquis of Londonderry, was born on February 13, 1849, and educated at Merton college, Oxford.

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Secretary Carlisle Does Not Think the Regulations Have Had Any Good Effect.

Washington, Jan. 23.—In the report which Secretary Carlisle sent to the house today in response to the Dingley resolution which formed the basis of the debate on the Alaska seal question today, the secretary states that from information compiled from official sources 121,145 seals were killed by pelagic sealers last year.
