BALLOT BOX STUFFING.

The Profane Boast of Deputy Farr in the West Huron Case.

Ottawa, Aug. 2.—This process of driving the Opposition to a finish by means of early-morning and late-at-night sessions of the House, with committees sitting simultaneously is not having the result which the Government hoped. Tired the Opposition members are, but they are sticking to their posts, while members of the Government side, to whom the burden of the responsibility falls in chamber, and committee rooms, are unable to keep up their end. The result is that the proceedings of the most important committee of the House—the committee on privileges and elections—are being prolonged unduly. The committee was late in getting started to-day, but when it did get to work the evidence adduced was such as to mark it out for the most serious developments since the inquiry began, and that is saying a good deal, when the revelations of bogus ballots in the Colborne poll are kept in mind. To-day's evidence turned upon the dealings at poll No. 3, in Goderich—witnesses, the gentleman who was rusticated somewhere across the line at the expense of somebody else, if his own stories are to be believed. The evidence given by Mr. Henry Armstrong, the poll clerk, showed the worst kind of crookedness prevailing; that the ballot box was stuffed for Mr. Holmes, the Liberal candidate, that ballots were deliberately destroyed which should have gone into the box and that Deputy Returning Officer Farr boasted of having done the stuffing.

The committee was called for 10:30 this morning, yet for a mortal hour the eleven members of the minority sat and waited for the pleasure of the Ministers. But, as Mr. Borden said, none of the Ministers seemed to care enough about it to be there. At 20 minutes to 12 Mr. Sifton put in an appearance, and Mr. Borden registered an emphatic protest against the way things are being run. He moved, in conclusion, that the quorum of the committee be reduced to ten. Mr. Sifton said the fault lay with the Opposition, who kept the House up late at night and all night, and if it had been the practice not to commence in the absence of a Minister it was not an arrangement made by the Ministers themselves. There not being a quorum present, it was decided not to push the motion but to proceed by consent.

A POLL CLERK'S EVIDENCE.
Henry Armstrong, poll clerk at poll No. 3, Goderich, Mr. James Farr's poll, — being sworn and examined by Mr. Powell, said that 118 electors voted there, Farr voted for McLean and 72 for Holmes. There was one rejected ballot and two destroyed ballots. "When were they destroyed?" "I think they were destroyed before poll opened. I heard Mr. Farr say they were not printed." "Then there are ten blank ballots?" "Yes, they came out of the box after it was opened." "And this one rejected ballot was void?" "Yes. It came out of the box, certainly. I think it was because we couldn't tell for whom it was marked." "I want to get out of you how many ballots came out of that box; will you count them?" "There were 123 came out of the box." "How many were in?" "One hundred and eighteen ballots." "Then is what extent was the box stuffed?" "After some hesitation witness an-

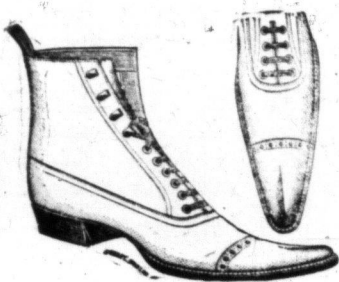
