THE ADVANTAGES ARE :-

- (d) Military Subjects, relating to the Imperial and Canadian Permanent Force and Militia.
- (e) The Mounted Police.
- (f) Explorations and Travels.
- (4) Mines and their Operation.
- (h) All other matter not included above.

2nd.—The publication of letters would be the means of making us more familiar with the names of the members, many of whom by necessity are strangers, and at the same time would establish a friendly feeling between the different graduating classes, showing that the Club is maintained for all, and has for its object the welfare and interests of each nember individually as well as the whole generally.
