SAD NEWS REAGHES

MRS. WM. WHEPLEY.

Called Home to Boston Saturday by Husband's Illness.

Telegrams Came in Quick Succession—Left Children Here—Detailed Information Not Yet Obtained.

Mrs. Wm. Whempley, of Boston, who with her children, has been spending the summer at the home of her mother-in-law, Mrs. Wm. Whempley, of Long Beach, Kings county, received a telegram on Saturday from Boston, stating that her husband was seriously ill and asking her to come home at once. The message from Boston reached St. John on Friday evening. It was sent in care of Mrs. H. Whempley, of Adelaide Road, a sister of Mrs. William Whempley. The latter was in Long Beach at the time, and her sister took the message and started Saturday morning on the steamer Victoria to take it to her. It happened that Mrs. Wm. Whempley was coming into the city that same morning on business by the steamer Elaine and passed her sister on the river without knowing it. On going into F. W. Daniel's store she first learned of her husband's illness from her nephew, Burton Whempley, who is employed in that store. While Mrs. W. Whempley was in the city a second telegram arrived stating that her husband's condition was worse and asking her to make haste in returning home. She left for Boston on the six o'clock train Saturday evening, leaving her children, one boy and two girls, at Long Beach. The message stated that Mr. Whempley was in the Highland private hospital. Mrs. Whempley left her husband well some four or five weeks ago, and the message came to her as a great shock. She thought it possible that the injury might have been the result of a sun-stroke, as it was very hot in Boston at that time. The particulars of Mr. Whempley's condition are expected here by letter today.

SALMON BOAT RACES

AT WESTFIELD

The Mona, John Frodsham's Boat, Got

First Place—Race Excellent and Keen.

The fourth race in the Peters' cup series was held at Westfield on Saturday. There was a large crowd present to watch the contest, as the interest taken in these races is great. A large number of the Trinity Sunday school picnic also watched the contest which was very close.

Four boats, the Lolita, Florence, Leola and Mona have now won a victory apiece, and it will be a battle royal between these four to capture the cup, as they are all evenly matched.

The preparatory gun was fired at 2.30. At five minutes before the boats all got under way, well bunched. The wind was light, the boats taking two hours and ten minutes to complete the course, finishing at 5.45.

The judges were Mayor Sears, Geo. Robertson and Murray Jarvis. They went over the course with the salmon boats in Mr. Jarvis' motor boat.

It is the intention of the sailing committee to continue the races every Saturday until one boat has captured first place three times. From present prospects the races will continue well on into September, and this is very pleasing to the suburban residents as the yacht race has come to be one of the week-end attractions.

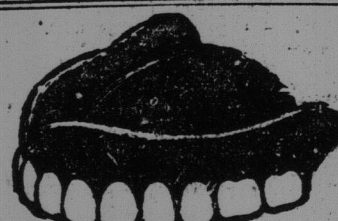

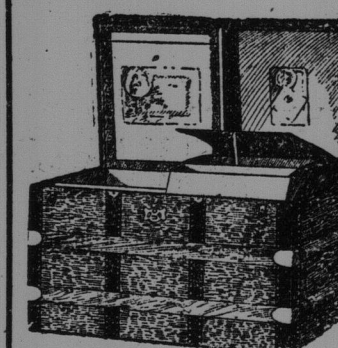
