The boys stated that they had come down from their room, and, not finding their mother about, supposed she had gone out to a store to get something for breakfast.

Flamenhift entered the sitting room and found his wife's shawl laying on a sofa. Knowing she had not gone out without it, he became alarmed and began a search for her. Not finding her in any of the rooms of the house, he repaired to the cellar with his sons, and there they were almost overcome to find the wife and mother lying on the cellar floor with her head almost severed from her body. By her side lay the great knife her husband used in his business.

Mrs. Flemenhift was still breathing, and the patrol wagon from Mayomensing station was called and started with her on a wild gallop for Mount Shai Hospital, but she died just before the institution was reached. Her body was then taken to the morgue and later removed to her home, where it was prepared for burial.
