COUNCIL RATIFIED CUSHING'S DISMISSAL BY BOARD OF WORKS, HAMM AND LEWIS NAY

Latter Thinks That Ex-Director Will Have Claim Against the City— Recorder Will Look Into the Matter—Ald. Baxter's Strong Speech—Engineer Peters Appointed Director Temporarily Council Refused Chipman House as Gift.

After a stormy session the Common Council yesterday afternoon accepted the recommendation of the Board of Works and R. H. Cushing has been retired from the position of director of public works. Until the next appointment is made Consulting Engineer Peters will be in charge of the department. As a result of the council's decision on this question, they did not pass the recommendation that the director be instructed to proceed at once with the restoration of Union street according to the plan and estimate submitted by him, which estimate amounted to \$20,790. This question is sent back to the board with power to act. Ald. Kelley strongly opposed the city having anything to do with the Chipman House, and as a result the offer of the building board of the Y. M. C. A. to give the city the building was declined with thanks.
