

WINNIPEG, Feb. 22.—Tonight in the legislature an enormous petition signed by 26,000 names, every one of which is said to be a bona fide elector of the province, was presented by the member for Centre Winnipeg on behalf of the liquor interests who are urging amendments to the local veto law which will mean a return to a two-thirds vote to make the law applicable.
