Actions of Mayor Douglas —The Coal Company is Steadily Winning, More Men Going to Work Every Day

After the meeting of the police committee yesterday when the appointment of 250 special police officers by lice committee, an effort was made by the Mayor and his friends to have the appointments again approved and the men reinstated, and this was done by His Worship, who informed the men who were acting as special U. M. W. police officers to keep their badges of office until he told them to take them

There is little change in the general strike situation at the collieries of the Dominion Coal Company. Yesterday was the 12th, and, as usual, a very great crowd of miners, including many strikers and P. W. A. men who are working, went to Sydney to attend the celebration by the L. O. L. Lodges of Cape Breton. This, of course, lessened the output, but not as much as expected, as it was reported at the general office last night that over 5,000 tons had been produced from all mines yesterday.

This morning's reports from the collieries received at the company's colliery offices are most encouraging and with the exception of Dominion No. 2 all the mines are doing splendidy and more men are returning to work every

more men are returning to work every day.

At Dominion No 1, Grand Secretary Moffatt's stronghold, there were six hundred men working yesterday, and today twenty-six new men appeared for places. Among these were several U. M. W. men who came back to take their old places in the mine.

Reserve was another stronghold of the P. W. A., but has not been doing as well as No. 1 colliery, and out of 900 men only about 300 are working. Small gains were reported in all the smaller collieries this morning. It is reported that the output would reach about 6-000 tons today, at least.

The strikers have heen very quiet during the past several days, particularly since the militia arrived on the scene, and no trouble has been caused up to the present. The U. M. W. special officers appointed by the mayor continue to make trouble for the men and every day arrests are made which are illegal and made by these officers, whose sole object is their anxiety to prevent men from returning to work. The U. M. W. officials claim that there are barely half the number of men claimed by the company at work in the collieries, and that the output yesterday was barely 700 instead of 4,000 tons, the figures given out by the coal company.

VON BUELOW'S SUCCESSOR

Retiring Chancellor Names the Man to Take His Place-Will Have Another Guess if the Emperor Objects.

BERLIN, July 13.—Prince Von Buelow, the retiring imperial chancellor, will formally propose in his audience with Emperor William tomorrow that he be succeeded by Dr. Von Holweg, secretary of the interior and vice-chancellor. They were fraternity brothers in the Borussia Corps at Bonn, and during the entire reign of William, Dr. Von Bethmann Holweg has often advised his majesty. But he has shown a disinclination to accept high office. He is a man of reserved and thoughtful habits and sometimes has been called "The Philosopher Statesman."
