

CHANGES IN TARIFF OF AUSTRALIA

General advance of 5 to 10 p. c. preference of goods from Gr. Britain—Canada does not share in preference

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 16.—The first increase in the new Australian tariff, information concerning which has been received by the Trade and Commerce Department, is the general advance of from five to ten per cent in the preference upon goods manufactured in the United Kingdom by advancing the duties upon goods imported from all other countries to that extent. This preference does not extend to Canadian products and manufactures, so that Canadian exporters will not have to face increased duties.

The second increase is in the duties from which increased revenue is desired, and the third increase covers the increased protection promised, prior to the recent elections to Australian industries.

In the order named the principal articles of goods and products imported into Australia are agricultural implements, motor cars and vehicle parts, printing paper, lumber and fish in tins.

RELIEF WORK IN ITALY SUFFERS FOR LACK OF ORGANIZATION

Many victims of earthquake might have been saved had relief work been carried out more promptly.

Rome, Jan. 16.—The Messagero and other Rome newspapers complain of the lack of organization in the relief work, which is said to have led to delay in rescuing victims of the earthquake. There is also an insufficiency of supplies, particularly in the remote districts.

This situation is deplored even by the king, who expressed his sorrowful surprise that persons who might have been saved by prompt work have perished in the ruins, while many who were rescued have died of hunger and thirst.

The paper says the king halted a detachment of soldiers, asking where it was going. On being told that it was going to Casarsa, the king expressed surprise that after so long a time it was still necessary to send troops. He added that he himself was going to Casarsa.

The officer in command of the detachment replied that the road was impassable for automobiles.

This is the seventh time that he has appeared on the charge of drunkenness within a month.

James Lockhart, charged with assaulting a man in view of the police, pleaded not guilty and was remanded. Officer Totten testified as to the assault.

Frank McCullough, reported by Mr. S. M. Wetmore, secretary of the S. P. C., for cruelly beating a horse, admitted that he struck the animal twice, but denied any cruelty. Mr. Wetmore testified that he struck the horse continuously for a distance of about fifty yards. Fined \$10.

Hartland, N. B., Jan. 15.—At last Hartland residents are privileged to traverse the streets at night without danger to life and limb. For a long time the place has complained of the darkness and discussed various plans to light the streets but nothing ever came of it. Then the Women's Institute took the matter up and as a result there are now several gasoline lamps attached to telephone poles in positions were most needed and the streets are well lighted. The lamps are more powerful than the ordinary arc lights used in cities and the light penetrates for long distances. The installation has taken about all the available cash the ladies had and more must be provided for gasoline and attendance. J. W. Montgomery installed the system and is at present looking after its attendance.

DARING ENGLISH AIRMAN WHO LED RAID ON ZEPPELINS ON WAR MISSION IN AMERICA



THE NEW SOPWITH BIPLANE AT BROOKLANDS

Herewith is shown Squadron Commander Spenser Grey, daring British airman, who is in America on a war mission. It was Commander Grey who commanded the little British squadron of three naval aeroplanes which on September 22 made a successful attack on the German airship sheds at Dusseldorf, destroying a Zeppelin. On October 8 Commander Grey flew 100 miles from Antwerp into the enemy's country at Cologne, where he dropped bombs on the railway station, which was damaged. Commander Grey, when seen in New York city, was unwilling to discuss his reported mission to this country, which is said to be the purchase of aeroplanes, although he displayed great interest in American devices. Commander Grey flies what is believed to be the fastest aeroplane in the British navy service. It is the racing Sopwith biplane, designed for the 1914 race for the Coupe Internationale d'Aviation. This contest was abandoned owing to the war.

BELGIAN RESERVISTS ON WAY FROM WEST TO FIGHT GERMANS

Two Hundred Pass Through Montreal for Halifax to Sail for Home—Given Great Reception.

Montreal, Jan. 15.—Two hundred Belgian reservists went through Montreal this morning for home to help Kaiser's men.

Most of the crowd were from the far west and northwest.

The men of the west arrived by the C. P. R., and after being feted by the local Belgian enthusiasts marched to Bonaventure station where they embarked for Halifax, at 9:30 a. m. amidst enthusiastic cheering.

Two barns with their contents belonging to Thomas Davis, Bayside, near Port Elgin, were destroyed Thursday morning by fire. The stock destroyed consisted of fourteen head of cattle and three horses. The loss sustained is estimated to be about \$2,000.

A NEW LIGHTING SYSTEM FOR HARTLAND STREETS

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REBEL FORCES HAVE TAKEN CAPE HAITIEN

American Government has been asked to send Warships to protect interests of foreigners against Revolutionists.

Cape Haitien, Haiti, Jan. 16.—The Haitian revolutionists today entered and took possession of Cape Haitien. This followed an understanding between the rebels and the local garrison.

There was no disorder during the turning over of authority. General Guillaume, a candidate for the presidency, is in command of the local forces.

The foreign consuls here have asked the American consul to request the Washington government to send a warship to protect the interests of foreigners at this port.
