

DONALDSON LINE BOAT TORPEDOED

Steamer Tritonian, Bound
from Halifax to Liverpool,
and British Bark Sunk.

Washington, Mar. 2.—Detailed reports of the sinking of the British bark *Calcutta* and the *Donaldson* line freight steamer *Tritonian*, both with Americans aboard, two of whom are missing, were received by the state department today from Consul Frost, at Queenstown. The reports in part follow:

The British bark *Calcutta*, Queenstown from Buenos Aires, cargo maize, attacked by submarine 4.30 p.m., Feb. 27th, seventy-four miles west southwest of Bell Rock. Four Americans aboard. Two are missing, believed. William Johnson, 19, Bell street, New York, aged nineteen, and David Walker, negro, Green County, Va., aged thirty.

The second reads: "Donaldson freight line, *Tritonian*, 2,846 tons, Halifax to Liverpool, with general cargo and horses, torpedoed without warning 11.35 p.m., fifty miles west of Dingle, Feb. 26. Two men missing from crew of sixty. Sole American, John Murphy, fourth engineer, saved. Weather heavy, westerly swell, dense darkness, lights out, no lights shown. Master saw torpedo approaching ship, striking starboard bow. Ship abandoned thirty minutes, but did not sink.

"Boats stood by until admiralty patrol arrived, five a.m. and towed her to 7.30 a.m., when she sank. Submarine never sighted.

"Master's boat not heard from. Believed to have been lost. Captain's boat rescued by steam boat *Charing Cross*. Boats were in imminent danger. Submarine offered no aid. Ship carried neither gun nor wireless. No attempt to escape."

METHODIST NOTES.

The Methodist Monthly Greeting, Newfoundland, of February brings with it the annual greetings of Rev. Edwin Moore, president of the conference; of the late Rev. George Patton and the Rev. Jabez R. Saint, with a cut also of the latter's attractive looking church at Broad Cove. The church, school hall and parsonage at Black Head and the school hall, Adam's Cove, Black Head circuit, has all been completed. The church, the Black Head parsonage is over seventy years old, the oldest in Newfoundland. Accompanying the president's photo is a suitable New Year's message to the members and adherents of the Methodist church in the colony.

The quarterly United League service at George street church was very enjoyable. A much appreciated address was given by Rev. Gordon D. M. A., on "Missions." The music was very pleasing and the address of Rev. N. M. Guy, M. A., made a capital finish.

Revs. D. B. Hemm and Dr. Bond have been delivering very impressive sermons in the Cochrane street church.

The ministers of Halifax are holding special prayer and other meetings from now until Easter, hoping to deepen the spiritual life of the churches and help others to decide for God.

Mrs. George Tilley, B. A., is the teacher of a teachers' training class at Pointe-aux-Lies. The course of study being used is Barclay's "First Standard and Manual of Teacher Training." The boys' class has been chartered by the pastor and is beginning some of Canadian Standard Efficiency work. Rev. George Tilley, B. A., has been sick for some three weeks. He is now able to resume his regular duties.

Mr. Allison debating team is Messrs. W. D. Withrow, 17; leader; L. F. Curtis, 17; and D. B. Smith, 18. Withrow and Curtis were members of last year's team which defeated Dalhousie at Halifax.

Rev. Charles Stebbings and his sister have been visiting their home, Wolfville, on account of the hospitalization of their father, Rev. Thos. Stebbings, who is now improving in health. The Grenfell official board in appreciation of the services of four of its local preachers prepared a banquet and presented each with a gold head ebony cane. Dr. W. A. Cooke and Darwin ably presented the claims of the missionary society on the following Sunday. Dr. Cooke made an appeal and \$1,200 was subscribed. The advance will be \$300 over last year.

There are three other local preachers on this field and Mrs. Nixon, wife of the pastor, frequently preaches. In July, a larger area is covered than is possible on a one man circuit. Seventy students from Regina College have gone to the front. Three have made the supreme sacrifice. Two more ministers have been ordained, Rev. Jas. Griffith, of Imperial, members of the 49th Battalion, commanded by Lt.-Col. C. B. Kenealy, etc.

The Rev. Joseph Coulter, A. B., of Trinity church, Calgary, stands face to face in many fashion with a hard task, to raise from outside sources \$40,000 for the debt on the church, owing to conditions brought on by the war, and to save the men who are on the bonds from financial ruin. He has sent out thousands of letters and is meeting with some response. It is hoped all who can will lend a hand by sending a few dollars to help Trinity in her great need. A small church, West Calgary, has sent out fifty-three men, every single man available and some married, quite a record.

Evangelist Thos. B. Coombs, formerly commissioner of the Salvation Army, now a member of St. Paul's

Methodist church, Brampton, Ontario, has been conducting very successful meetings in that church.

Bowmanville, Ontario, must be a very unique town, even in war times. There is work for every person who wants to work and poverty is a stranger and has been since local option came into operation in May, 1908. Rev. Capt. W. G. Clarke, B. A., pastor of the Methodist church, announced to his congregation on Sunday that the usual collection taken on Communion Sunday for the poor fund would not be needed as there are no dependants on the fund. This is certainly a very satisfactory condition in a church comprising some 550 families in a town of between 3,500 and 4,000 inhabitants. The only bad condition there is a house famine, for unlike many other towns through the foothought of the local dealers there is a plentiful supply of coal.

The Rev. Dr. Hearts assisted Exmouth street church, St. John, in celebrating its sesquicentennial anniversary. He unveiled a portrait of the late Rev. Dr. Stewart, and also preached on Sunday morning. Next July will be fifty years since Dr. Hearts took charge of the church. His bride accompanied him both to work for the Master and the Doctor's energy appears to be unabated. We are pleased to learn that the president of the conference, Rev. Thos. Hicks, is recovering from his recent illness and hopes to resume his work at once.

Rev. Dr. Borden and Professors Line and Wheelock spoke in the churches in Halifax on the educational question and solicited both students and financial help with good success.
