LONDON STOCK MARKET

QUIETER YESTERDAY
Undertone Generally Steady
—Russian Issues Weak—
Bank of England Statement.

Special to The Standard.
London, Sept. 6.—The stock market was quiet today, but the steady undertone continued in most departments, especially gilt edged securities, rubber stocks and Japanese bonds. The latter advanced on redemption prices. Spanish bonds were better with the favorable move in exchange, but Russian issues were weak after temporary firmness. Argentine rails were easy on strike rumors, and American securities moved irregularly. Money was in good supply and discount rates were quiet.

The weekly statement Bank of England shows following changes:
Total reserve, decreased 2,273,000. Circulation, increased 2,283,000. Bullion, decreased 14,390. Other securities, decreased 7,759,000. Public deposits, decreased 2,064,000. Other deposits, decreased 6,097,000. Notes reserve, decreased 255,000. Government securities, decreased 105,000. The proportion of the bank's reserve to liabilities this week is 18.92 per cent., last week it was 18.31 per cent.

CITY HAS ORGANIZED FOR CONTROL OF FOOD, DR. ROBERTSON'S ADDRESS

Lieut. Gov. Ganong Presides at Interesting Meeting—Forceful Address to Citizens—Causes for the World Shortage—A Strong Food Control Committee Appointed.

In "win the war" service. In its final analysis the situation will be saved by the growing of single plants, the regulation of single bites and the prevention of any bit of waste.

Provincial Committee To Supervise.

The food controller desires the formation in every province of a provincial body which will act as a supervising body, a central directing and coordinating body which will help the many other organizations of men and women in the province who could render invaluable services in food control. Already the departments of agriculture, the national service leagues and other bodies have done excellent work in the campaign for increased production. A provincial committee with representatives of the departments of agriculture and education, women's organizations, organized labor, etc., could be a means for enlarging and improving the work which has been well begun. A provincial organizer is needed and will be appointed. His time will be devoted to the organization of local food control committees, who will seek to secure the co-operation of every organization and every householder in the locality in carrying out the recommendations of the food controller and in adopting others which will doubtless occur to their own members.

Pledge Cards To Be Signed.

The local food control committee in every place will be the body by which information will be passed on to the individual householders. As a first step, the women of the local food control committee will undertake to personally distribute the food service pledge cards. The intention is to have every home visited by some woman who will interest the housekeeper in food control and ask her to sign the following pledge:

"Realizing the gravity of the food situation and knowing that Great Britain and her Allies look to Canada to help to avert Germany's threat of starvation, I pledge myself and my household to carry out conscientiously the advice and directions of the food controller and in adopting others which will doubtless occur to their own members."

One copy will be retained in the office and one sent on to the provincial headquarters. Together with the pledge card, a card for display in the window of the house will be left. It shows that the family is committed to food control and becomes a daily reminder to the household and others who see it of the duty of observing the pledge. The window card is as follows:

To win the war this household is pledged to carry out conscientiously the advice and directions of the food controller.

Substitutes for Flour, Beef and Bacon.

The local food control committee will also arrange for the carrying on of a campaign of education in the most intelligent and economical use of foods in order that the people may be well nourished, that no food shall be wasted, and that the food of the family may be obtained at the most reasonable cost that is practicable under war conditions. While many housekeepers have knowledge of the relative values of foods, many others have not had any opportunity of learning. It will not be news to many housekeepers that oatmeal is a first rate breakfast food. It may be news and good news to these times of high prices that for growing children and working men and women, in terms of nourishment and energy produced, one pound of oatmeal is as practicable substitute for two dozen eggs; one pound of oatmeal may be used to replace 1 1/2 lbs. of beef; one pound of cheese has a nourishing value equal to 3 1/2 lbs. of beef; and cheese and potatoes make a well balanced meal.

Information on these topics will not only be exceedingly useful but it will be very interesting to the housekeepers in every locality. The local food control committee will arrange for demonstrations on preserving, canning and storing the more perishable foods produced in gardens. It will not be too early for the local food control committee to begin in September and October to plan for the campaign of increased production in the season of 1938.

The local food control will also occupy itself in some centres in seeing to what extent the cost of distribution causes unnecessary increase in the prices of foods as delivered at the homes.

A. O. Skinner thought that some of the ladies named were busily occupied with other war work and that others whose time was not so busily occupied be asked to serve on this committee.

At Mr. Frink's suggestion the names of the ladies present were added to the committee.

On motion of R. E. Armstrong the ladies on the food control committee were constituted a committee to distribute the cards of the fuel controller impressing the need of food control along the households of the city.

Governor Ganong said that he desired to make the statement that St. John was the banner city for women's war work. This city was the great clearing house of eastern Canada. The women of this city had arisen to the occasion and had performed in a manner creditable to the women of the Dominion.

Mr. Armstrong at this stage read a telegram from President Roosevelt expressing his inability to attend, owing to an executive meeting being held at Fredericton. The premier expressed his best wishes for the success of the meeting and the campaign in this city. His Honor Judge Armstrong asked that the ladies be given the opportunity of real work on tables during two days of the week.

Dr. Robertson said that just at present and that the food controller wanted to stop the unnecessary consumption of beef. The matter of prohibiting the use of real food had been discussed and while farmers were advised not to sell or kill young cattle, it was not deemed necessary to prohibit the use of veal at this stage.

Professor Robertson expressed his gratitude to Governor Ganong for his presence and attendance and the able manner in which he discharged the duties of presiding officer. He also expressed appreciation of the messages from the premier.

Mrs. J. W. Lawlor, president of the Housewives League, discussed local problems which she thought might well be taken up by the committee.

The meeting closed at 4.30 o'clock with the singing of the National Anthem.

MA JAY WINS CHARTER OAK

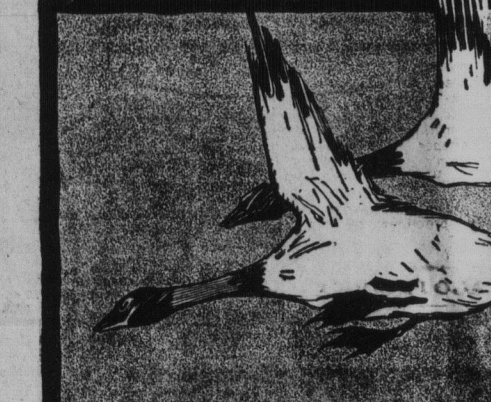
Peter June and Letanna S. Other Firsts at Hartford — "Pop" Geers Decorated.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties of six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead patent and cultivate 20 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent of certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$500.00.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive priority in applying for entry at local Agency Office (not Sub-Agency). The necessary papers must be presented to Agency.
