CHARLOTTE COUNTY SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKERS IN SESSION

One of the Most Successful Conventions in the History of the Association Was Held at Scotch Ridge Last Week.

The annual convention of Charlotte County S. S. workers held at Scotch Ridge, on the 17th and 18th inst., was one of the most successful in the history of the association. The president, the Rev. Mr. Gough, conducted the programme of the several sessions. A fairly representative number of county officers besides about forty delegates. A splendid spirit of optimism pervaded the convention throughout and there is every reason to believe that the influence of this gathering of earnest S. S. workers will be at least county-wide.

A hearty address of welcome to the delegates was given by the Rev. Mr. Gough, pastor of the church and responded to by the Rev. D. R. Chown of Oak Hill. During the various sessions gripping addresses were given by the following clergymen: Rev. Mr. W. W. Malcolm of St. Stephen on "Wider Methods of Conducting Our S. S. Session"; Rev. J. E. Goudin on "The Responsibility of the Home in Bible Training and Social and Political Reform"; Rev. George Gough on "Prayer"; and Rev. D. R. Chown on "Charity." Much time was spent in discussing S. S. methods but perhaps the most far-reaching discussion was that on "S. S. and Reconstruction." It was found to be a difficult problem, but all expressed a heartfelt desire to help our returned men achieve their best.

POPULAR PREACHER OF BOSTON, MASS.

Rev. Austin K. DeBlois, Formerly of Wolfville, One of the Strongest Pulpit Orators of the Big City.

(From Our Special Correspondent.) Boston, Mass., July 19.—From earliest time the fame of the preachers of Boston has been nation-wide, and the recollections of such men as Phillips, Brooks of Trinity, George C. Loring of Tremont Temple and many others are delightful memories for the present generation. It may be truthfully said that the fame of Boston's preachers has shed a lustre to that city, the Athens of America.

The people of the Maritime Provinces are, above all the people of America, a church-going people, and consequently when they visit Boston they naturally inquire where a fine preacher, with excellent music, can be heard. One of the most popular and best known preachers of Boston today is Rev. Austin K. DeBlois, pastor of the Commonwealth Ave., and Clarendon St. Baptist Church (off Congress Square) who was born at Wolfville, Nova Scotia, and during his eight years of ministry here has endeared himself to the people, particularly Canadian born, of this city. Consequently, on Sunday mornings one is sure to meet other Canadians at this church when visiting Boston. In fact, the Maritime Provinces has always furnished its quota of ministers for Boston and nearby cities' churches, the most of whom have been graduates of Acadia College.

Dr. DeBlois was born at Wolfville, N. S., the son of Dr. Stephen W. DeBlois, for 30 years pastor of the Wolfville Baptist Church. The son graduated from Acadia College in the class of 1886 and then went to Brown University for a post graduate course, taking his Master's degree in 1888, and Ph. D. in 1889, being spoken of at that time as "the youngest Doctor of Philosophy in the World," and later the "youngest College President."

Dr. DeBlois later studied in Berlin and Leipzig, returning to America to take the vice-presidency of the Union Baptist Seminary at St. Martins, N. B., later made principal, and after serving for two years in that office was called to the Presidency of Shurtleff College, Alton, Ill., the oldest college west of Ohio.

Five years later he assumed the pastorate of the First Church of Elgin, just out of Chicago, a church of 1300 members. Later was pastor at the first First Church of Chicago, succeeding Dr. P. S. Henson, who had succeeded Dr. George C. Loring, both far famed pulpits orators.

About eight years ago Dr. DeBlois was called to the First Baptist Church, Boston, where he has since been preaching to large congregations. The First Baptist Church is one of the landmark edifices in Boston, designed by Richardson, the famous architect, and one of the oldest religious organizations in the Western Continent, founded in 1630, and has enjoyed 254 years of continuous life and illustrious history. The friezes on the tower were modeled by the French sculptor Bartholdi, and brought from France to adorn the beautiful edifice. Persons visiting Boston will find

THE FITZ-RANDOLPH DIVORCE CASE GOES TO JURY TODAY

Defendant on the Stand and Prosecution Was Unable to Shake Her Story—Denies Infidelity or Anything Improper Beyond Drinking.

Fredericton, July 23.—Mrs. Charles Fitz-Randolph's cross-examination by M. G. Tied, K. C., was concluded in the Fitz-Randolph divorce case this afternoon about 5 o'clock.

The jury were then dismissed until Thursday morning, when it was planned to have arguments by counsel. The end of the case is thus looked for some time tomorrow.

After the jury had been dismissed this afternoon counsel for the defence presented a number of legal questions was decided that the questions the jury will be given to answer will be whether or not the defendant is guilty of adultery on the five counts charged.

Mrs. Fitz-Randolph was on the stand for about five hours, and counsel for the plaintiff succeeded in making but little change in her original story of denial of infidelity, or anything improper beyond drinking.

LAND SETTLEMENT

Ex-Service and Other Small Holders Taking up Claims.

Fifty-two English County Councils report to the Board of Agriculture a total of about 20,000 recent applications for small holdings by ex-service men and others. Between 7000 and 8000 of these applicants have been interviewed by the Committees of the Councils, and 79 per cent. of them have been approved by suitable persons to have small holdings under the Local Authorities. Inquiries made some time ago among the armies in France suggested that most of the service applicants for small holdings would require only a cottage and an acre or so of land. The actual applications to date do not confirm this earlier impression.

THE ESSEQUIO DUE AT PORTLAND FRIDAY

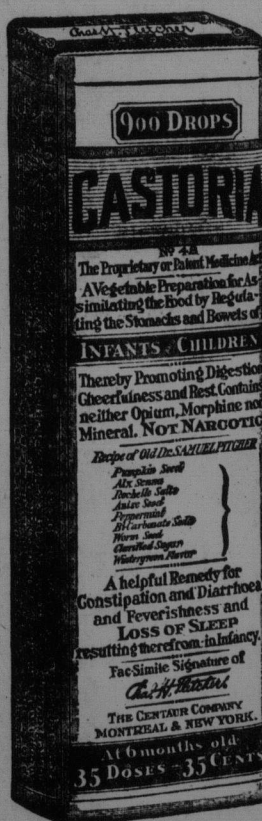
Portland, Me., July 23.—The hospital ship Essequibo is reported due here Friday noon with six hundred and fifty-one wounded Canadian soldiers.
