NO OFFICIAL REASON GIVEN FOR

No official reason for the resignation is obtainable.

In unofficial circles, however, the decision of the government is interpreted in three ways, first, as a protest against the reactionary regime proposed by General Chang Tsao-Lin, governor of Manchuria; second, the demand of Chang-Tsao-Lin for material support by the government, and third, a confession that the financial situation is impossible of solution.
