NEW SALVATION ARMY OFFICERS COMING TO CITY

Major Burrows of Toronto Will be Head Officer at St. John.

ENTIRE FAMILY IN S. A. UNIFORMS

Brigadier Moore from St. John is Transferred to Toronto East District.

Toronto, June 28.—A general shake-up in the ranks of the Salvation Army is taking place all over the Dominion, and many changes are being made in the ranks of the officers.

In more than 120 corps in various parts of eastern Canada the personnel of the staff is changed.

The changes, which take effect on July 1, will, it is expected, have far-reaching effects on the work of the army in various fields of the world.

Among the changes are the following:

Brigadier David Moore, from St. John, to be divisional commander, Toronto East Division.

Brigadier Thompson Watson, from Halifax, to be divisional commander, Toronto West Division.

Major William Burrows, from Toronto to St. John, N. B.

Staff Captain T. Burton, from Toronto to Halifax.

Staff Captain H. Ritchie, from Toronto to be divisional commander Bermuda Division.

In the case of Major William Burrows, who is being sent from Toronto to St. John, there are ten members in his family, all of whom are in the army, and six of whom are in uniform in Toronto.

Evangelist Will Open Big School

Old Baptist Seminary at St. Martins to be Made Headquarters for Bible Training.

Fredericton, N. B., June 28.—The old Baptist seminary at St. Martins, St. John County, now owned by the St. John men, is about to be put to use again, this time as the headquarters of the Bethel Bible School, quarters of the educational institution now owned by the Rev. W. Kenyon, who is being sent from Toronto to St. John, where they are expected to conclude arrangements for the purchase of the property.

Big Repair Scheme.

Inasmuch as the buildings are out of repair and will need a considerable amount of work, it is said that \$100,000 will be necessary to establish the new institution.

Mr. Sanson said that he had found opposition to students being recruited for Mr. Kenyon's school upon the ground that it meant sending the young people out of Canada, and inasmuch as his evangelistic activities had been confined largely to the Maritime Provinces in recent years, it has been decided to establish the school here, and the opportunities offered at St. Martins were found to be ideal. It will be an industrial school, as at Spencer, Mass., where students attending will have an opportunity to work at various kinds of employment to provide for their tuition and board.

Former Soldier Drowns in River

Fred L. Greer Victim of Fatal Seizure While Swimming Near Fredericton.

Fredericton, N. B., June 28.—Fredrick Lewis Greer, a returned soldier, who served for three years with the 25th Battalion in France, and was badly wounded, was drowned last evening at Long's Creek on the St. John River, 16 miles west of Fredericton, while in bathing with a party of his fellow employees of a maintenance crew engaged on the St. Valley Railway division of the C. N. R.

Seized With Cramps.

Early in the evening quite a large number of the men working on the railway were in bathing, and Greer, who was a strong swimmer, was not believed to be in trouble when he got out in the middle of the stream and was carried down the river some distance by the strong current. He was suddenly seized with cramps, however, and before any of his companions could reach him he sank out of sight. It was an hour later when the body was recovered from the bottom of the river in 12 feet of water.

Deceased was 30 years of age and a son of James Greer, of New Maryland, and besides his father is survived by two sisters, Miss Greer, of Grand Manan, and Miss Mildred, at home. He had been married about two years.

Bishop Worrall Quits

Halifax, N. S., June 28.—Most Rev. Clarendon Lamb Worrall, Archbishop of Nova Scotia, has resigned his see to accept the bishopric of Bermuda, it was announced here today. Later in the day the Bishop denied that he had formally tendered his resignation yet. Archbishop Worrall was consecrated Bishop of Nova Scotia in 1904, succeeding Bishop Frederick Courtney, retired. Subsequently he was elected archbishop of the ecclesiastical province of Canada. Previous to coming to this province, he was rector of St. Luke's Church, Kingston, Ont., and professor of English literature at the Royal Military College, Kingston, Ont. He was born at Smith's Falls, Ont., July 20, 1854, the son of the late Rev. Canon J. B. Worrall and Elizabeth (Lamb) Worrall. He was educated at Trinity College, Port Hope, and Trinity University of Ontario.

Archbishop Worrall was twice married, the present Mrs. Worrall being a sister of the Rev. H. P. Almon Abbott.

Yarmouth, N. S., June 28.—The sloop yacht Princess, purchased by St. John syndicate from the estate of the late James Terrell, and now en route from Halifax to the New Brunswick port, put in here yesterday in a leaking condition. She has been hauled out on the wharf here for repairs.

Five Days Alone With Broken Leg

Seventy Year Old Prospector Found in Serious Condition in the Forests.

Sydney, N. S., June 28.—After five days alone with a broken leg and without food, water or shelter, Michael B. McNeil, a 70-year-old prospector, was found by some boys in a patch of woods near Louisburg yesterday and carried for treatment to St. Joseph's Hospital, Glace Bay, where it is said today that his recovery is certain. McNeil left his home in Reserve on a prospecting trip with only two biscuits in his pocket, intending to purchase a supply of food at Louisburg. While clambering down a rocky ledge he fell and fractured a leg.

Thousand Acre Farm Is Sold

Northumberland Property is Transferred for \$12,000 With All Stock.

Fredericton, N. B., June 28.—One of the most important sales of farm properties in York county was completed this morning when the Ludlow Hill farm at Queensbury, consisting of 1,000 acres, was purchased by Mel. Pond, of Ludlow, Northumberland county, the price that was paid being approximately \$12,000.

The property is one of the largest and best individual farm properties along the St. John Valley. Its frontage extending over a mile along the river, while it contains two separate sets of buildings, as well as valuable woodlands. In addition to complete farming equipment, forty head of cattle, forty sheep and five horses were included in the transaction.

Injured in Woods

Stanley Ltd. of Douglas, while cutting pulpwood in the woods at Royal Road, was seriously injured when he slipped and fell on the blade of the axe, inflicting a deep gash. His brother-in-law, Mr. Seymour, was with him at the time of the accident, and he brought him out of the woods and to Victoria Hospital, where it was found necessary to take six stitches to close the wound. As the axe penetrated the skull, it was not known today just how serious the result of the accident would be.

MRS. PERRY MUST STAND TRIAL ON MURDER CHARGE

Grand Jury Returns a True Bill Against Woman Accused of Killing Husband.

CROWDS OF WOMEN ATTEND HEARING.

Judge Tells Grand Jury Evidence is Largely Circumstantial Nature.

Yarmouth, N. S., June 28.—The case of Mrs. Clara Elizabeth Perry, charged with the murder of her husband, George H. Perry, on or about February 28 last, was presented to grand jury this morning by Justice Humphrey Mellish, presiding over the supreme court, which opened its sessions here this morning. Late in the afternoon a true bill was returned against the woman. Justice Mellish in his charge to the jury said the accused was not to be indicted upon mere suspicion but they were to consider the evidence to see if there was a prima facie case. The evidence in the case was largely circumstantial, he said, and when it was sought to establish a case on such evidence, it was usual and proper to look for motives. Justice Mellish then reviewed the evidence tending to show disagreement between Captain and Mrs. Perry, and their subsequent reconciliation. Since then, he said, there was no evidence to show that there had been any serious disagreement between husband and wife, but on the other hand there was evidence to show that Mrs. Perry had been very attentive to her husband during an illness.

In conclusion Justice Mellish said: "Your task is an important one. You have to find out whether there is a prima facie case or not against this woman."

The Yarmouth Curling Rink, transferred into a hall of justice was crowded at this morning's hearing; fifty per cent of the attendance being women. The grand jury retired at 11.15 a. m.

Immediately on announcement of the verdict, W. J. O'Hearn, K.C., assisting R. W. Landry, K. C., Crown prosecutor, moved for the arrangement of Mrs. Perry at ten o'clock tomorrow morning. The court granted the motion and adjourned for the day.
