Waterworks Reviewed

The Annual report on the waterworks was submitted by Mr. J.C. Breithaupt, chairman of the Commission, in the "The Annual Report of the City Waterworks covering the twentieth year of the Municipal Ownership is herewith submitted.

were badly pitted and other extensive repairs would have been necessary to retain it.

We secured more water from Waterloo. The total consumption of water for the year was 428,078,750 gals, being an increase of only 2,137,075 gals over the previous year. We received from Waterloo \$3,571,250 gals, during the past year being an increase of 9,850,575 gals, over the previous year. Although water we received from Waterloo costs considerable more than our own pumping we consider our city has been very fortunate in having a neighbor who can supply our deficiency at this time.

As mentioned in previous reports, the Bridgeport wells should be utilized as soon as conditions become more normal and now that the great war is victoriously ended it is hoped that work may be taken up on this project which was started previous to the beginning of the war and has been delayed for the past few years. Plans for the project should be completed early during the present year so that work may be undertaken whenever conditions are favorable.

A detailed report of the past year's operations is hereto attached.

SALVATION ARMY HAS BIG PROGRAMME.

Soldiers Returning from Overseas Will Need Helping Hand Of This Efficient Social Service Organization.

Though the Salvation Army has been, since the commencement of the war, one of the most active agencies dealing with the needs and welfare of the men who have been fighting the nation's battles, it has not made a general appeal to the Canadian public. The war work of the Army has been supported largely by occasional tag days and from self-denial funds; but the problems of reconstruction are so great, and the Army's program to help the men get back to civil life is so extensive, that it is compelled to appeal to the generosity of the Canadian people for financial assistance.

The Salvation Army supplies for every kind of social need; it is doing a wonderful work in providing homes for fallen soldiers. In rescuing the drunkard, and in caring for the fatherless and neglected children, and now proposes to very extensively increase the scope of its operations in Canada to make it easy for the returned soldier to begin the new life.

The Salvation Army spent two million dollars on war activities and three hundred thousand soldiers were accommodated daily in the Salvation Army huts in the war area. One hundred thousand parcels of food and clothing were distributed among soldiers and sailors. War widows and orphans are being taken care of, and in many other ways, the Salvation Army has done a great deal to soften the lives of both the boys at the front and their dependents at home.

An elaborate program for the reconstruction campaign is contemplated by the Salvation Army. While there are hostels in large centres of population, these are not numerous enough to satisfy all the needs in the direction, so it is intended to take over large buildings convenient for the purpose and establish more hostels in large distributing centres from coast to coast. That is the first object of the campaign to raise one million dollars.

The second object is to provide emergency receiving and maternity homes for soldiers' wives, widows, and dependent children in need. Still another object is to continue during demobilization, both in England and France, the accommodations and the equipment that have made the Salvation Army huts the popular institutions that they are among the soldier boys.

It is felt that the Salvation Army is in a position, with its war experience and its peace-time work, to render valuable aid to the official Government bodies that are tackling the new peace problems. For this reason the prominent political chiefs of the country have endorsed the campaign, and have consented to act on the general committee.
