Local Reduction Will be \$1 Per H.P.

Superintendent Ascertains This From Hydro Commission.

The reduction in the power-rates of the Hydro Commission to this city will be \$1. This will bring the rate down to \$10 per horse power. Superintendent V. S. McIntyre received this information upon enquiry of The Hydro Commission this morning following the statement by Sir Adam Beck yesterday that there would be a reduction in the rates charged to fifty-one municipalities and the rates to consumers in the respective municipalities. The new schedule of rates for local consumers has not yet been compiled by the Hydro department but it is expected that it will be completed in a few days and ready for announcement. Nothing in the way of an idea of the new rate and as to what consumers would benefit was stated by the Department.

Mr. McIntyre pursuing the morning press reports said that apparently the reduction would affect the largest domestic consumers only. "There are very few in the city who would get the benefit of the third-class rate. It seems to be the purpose to encourage the use of electric stoves," he remarked. In one such example he figured out that there might be a reduction of 14 per cent.

INSPECTED GARBAGE PROPERTY

of the work was to be separated from the work of technical and industrial education, and continued under a separate head, while in speaking of the work ahead of the secondary schools, he declared that the future would find a great increase in the number of such schools specializing in commercial, industrial, agricultural and technical education.

At the close of his address Thomas Marshall, of Lincoln, educational critic of the Opposition, commented favorably upon some of the principal features. Z. Mageau, of Sturgeon Falls, moved the adjournment of the debate. Hon. Dr. Cody regarded as one of the greatest compliments which could be paid to the teachers of the province the never ending demands which were made upon them. And nearly every demand had been complied with. He expressed his appreciation of the incalculable service rendered the province by its splendid army of teachers.
